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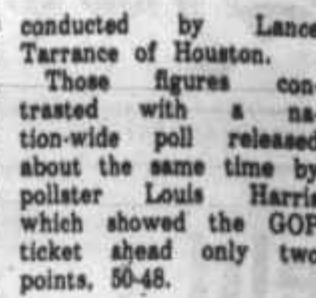

Houston is the only major Texas city with a law banning smoking in many public places. Whether a similar bill would make it past the Legislature's smoke-filled rooms is anyone's guess.

Fuel tax The law to increase revenues for education and highways became effective last week. Gasoline prices for both regular and unleaded, rose an extra five cents a gallon.

An additional 3.5 cents per gallon for diesel was tacked on in the recent special session. Retailers estimate that the average fuel bill for Texas will go up \$40 a year, unless competitive market forces keep it lower. The tax is actually paid by the supplier, who normally passes it on to the consumer.

Two resign Two top officials in state agencies resigned last week. Texas Secretary of State John Fair and Texas Veterans Land Board executive secretary

Harmon Lisnow, political assistant to Gov. Mark White for years, will resume his private law practice at a much higher salary.

Lisnow, whom some consider the best administrator in state government, leaves Land Commissioner Gary Mauro's employ to take work for Attorney General Jim Mattox.

Under Mauro and Lisnow, the new Veterans Housing Program approved 6,000 home loans for veterans.

Entex customers to benefit In reduction of gas cost

Entex customers in Eagle Lake will be the beneficiaries of a reduction in the cost of gas that the company purchases from its suppliers in this area.

According to W.H. Altenburg Jr., Entex manager in Eagle Lake, "The gas cost decrease will be passed on to our customers with bills rendered after August 3."

"The average monthly residential bill of 5,200 cubic feet of gas will be reduced \$1.40 from \$36.23 to \$34.83, a savings of about four percent."

"We welcome this decrease in the cost of gas from our supplier," Altenburg said, "and we are pleased to pass it along to our customers."

"There is an abundant supply of natural gas for all of our customers. It is by far the most efficient and least expensive form of energy available today," Altenburg said.

Help keep your livestock off roads

The Sheriff's office would like to ask all livestock owners to make every effort to keep the livestock from wandering on roadways. From time to time livestock will get out on the roadways in spite of every effort to prevent it. If a domestic disturbance on a road, however, make sure that fences are in a good state of repair which will prevent this. The law provides for a fine of \$100 for each animal found on the roadways to be brought to the auction barn and sold at public auction if the owner fails to claim the stock and pay for all expenses. The Sheriff's office does not wish to do that, however, they may be forced to do so if the problem continues. The Sheriff's Department will do all they can to prevent this and all livestock owners are asked to assist them by keeping the stock off the roadways.

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Child passenger safety — a new law

A law just passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor Mark White will go a long way toward protecting the health and safety of Texas children. The new law requires the use of automobile safety seats or seat belts for children under the age four. Its aim is to reduce the grim statistics which have Texas leading the nation in deaths and injuries for this age group.

Last year in Texas, 78 children under the age of four died as innocent passengers in automobiles, and another 6,000 were injured in motor vehicle accidents. National studies indicate that up to 80 percent of the deaths and injuries could have been avoided through the proper use of child passenger safety seats.

Texans lawmakers passed the bill mandating the use of child passenger safety seats systems on June 30, 1984. Specifically, the legislation requires reduced the number of children under two years old to be secured in child passenger safety seats, and children between the ages of two and four years to be secured by either safety seats or safety belts. The law goes into effect October 31, 1984.

The new legislation also provides for a \$250 fine for noncompliance, but the penalty can be dismissed if a person acquires a safety seat system within 10 days of the offense. No children under the age of four died as innocent passengers in automobiles, and another 6,000 were injured in motor vehicle accidents.
