## Shredded sunflowers mean more doves

Early August preparations for the opening of dove season, which is September 1, are well under way. Shredded sunflowers are being distributed to hunters. For an unusual large number of hunters, 10 shredded areas are sufficient.

"Although most farmers consider sunflowers to be a nuisance, they provide excellent food for doves," said. "Wildlife biologists rate native sunflower seeds as one of the best mourning dove foods in Texas. One reason is because sunflowers produce seed earlier in the summer than many plants."

Dove are almost exclusively seed eaters. They have been feeding on weed and grass seed produced last fall or this spring. Sunflowers are a fresh food supply, usually beginning in July. But seed in the seedheads are not available to the birds. Shredding can solve the dove's problem. Fair Hernandez, said doves do not have Stoddard's feet adapted for climbing or clinging to standing sunflower plants. They are strong fliers, good walkers, adequate perchers, but poor scrappers. This is why dove feed should not be covered with litter, debris, and thick vegetation. The birds should be able to walk about looking for seed with relative ease. Doves can find plenty of open ground to feed in shredded sunflower fields. "During the first

one week before the opening of dove season, which is September 1, we shredded the remainder of your field, not exceeding five acres. Unless you're planning for an unusually large number of hunters, 10 shredded areas are sufficient.

## Rehabilitation of safety rest area on IH-10 discussed

The rehabilitation of the safety rest area on Interstate 10, 4.5 miles west of Columbus was discussed during a pre-construction meeting held at 1:30 p.m. on July 31 at the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation office in Columbus.

JKW Construction, Inc. of Austin was the low bidder on this project at \$245,000. The work consists of repair and improvements to the arbor units, comfort stations, water systems, sewage disposal systems and illumination of the rest area near the east-bound and west-bound lanes of Interstate 10.

Bruce Bayless, supervising resident engineer in charge of construction, said, "Because of the extent of work to be done to these rest areas, they will be closed to the public for a period of three to four months."

The contractor is expected to begin work on this project in August of 1984 and has been allotted 60 working days for completion.
