Bygone days of Eagle Lake presented at Study Club

Eagle Lake Study Club members and visitors assembled in the library conference room of the Eula and David Wintermann Library on Wednesday, January 9.

Miss Kathryn McRee hosted a panel on "Entertainment in Eagle Lake in Bygone Days." Members of the panel were David Wintermann, Gardner Duncan, Bruce Waddell and Fulton Drumgoole. Miss McRee commented that the five taking part in the program represented about 350 years of entertainment in Eagle Lake.

Mr. Wintermann's comments covered many forms of entertainment of note including a bull fight in 1904 at a carnival featuring a famous toreador, parades with elaborate floats, the pavilion on the lake that was destroyed during the 1909 storm, and the first radio antenna erected at the Hayes Stephens residence during World War I days was commented on by Gardner Duncan. There were chautauques, guest stars, lectures, tent shows, presenting melodramas, domino playing and "42." One of the most exciting

events was an airplane flying from Ellington Field and landing in Kate Griffith's pasture. Mr. Waddell told of football, baseball and basketball played between 1925 and 1940. During this period Eagle Lake produced some very fine athletes. One of the outstanding athletes was Bill Wallace, All-American at Rice Institute and a member of the Texas Football Hall of Fame.

Mr. Waddell mentioned that there were very few, if any, geese to be seen in the vicinity in the 1920's and 1930's. Duck was "King." Over 100,000 ducks were estimated to be in the Eagle Lake area. The duck limit at the time was 50.

Mr. Drumgoole told of our cities municipal entertainment on the square. A band under the direction of Axel Seaholm played at the square. All of the Seaholm sons played an instrument. Mr. Drumgoole played in R.B. Davis' band in 1928.

Miss McRee concluded the program by saying "there was never a dull moment" during those early days of Eagle Lake.

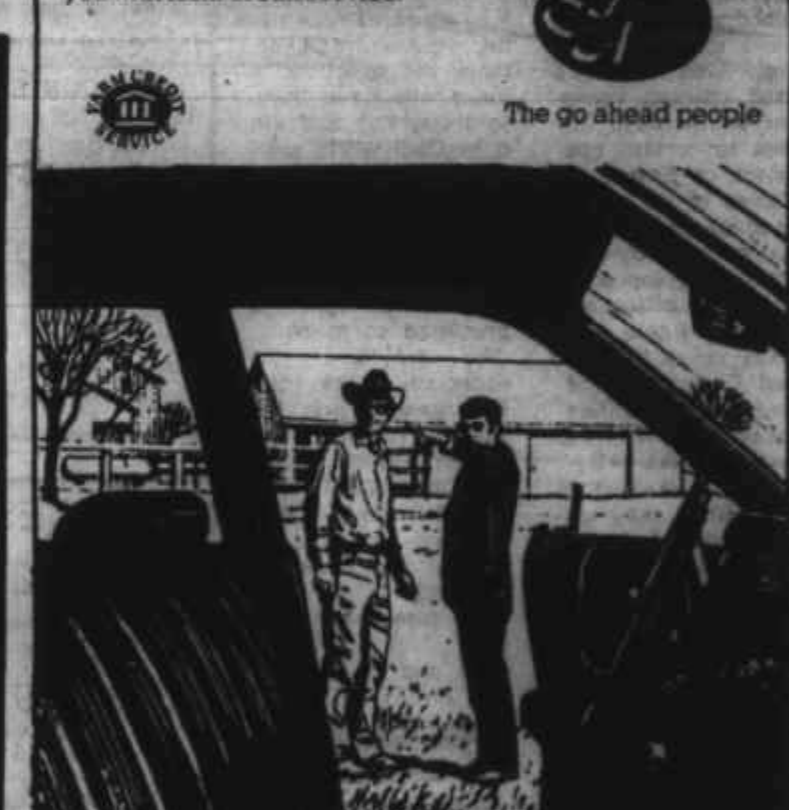
