Smithsonian to select 30 interns from 1985 class

The Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C. is offering five-week internships to 30 students who will graduate from high school this year. Seniors may apply for positions in various departments and offices in the Institution, in areas including archaeology, biology, public affairs, photography, history, veterinary science, art, carpentry, library science and computer science.

Students chosen for the program will each receive a living allowance of \$450. The interns will spend Tuesday through Friday in the host office, learning first-hand about career and academic possibilities. In addition to these duties, the interns will tour sites that many visitors to Washington, D.C. do not see, such as the history of the Smithsonian, American States and Embassy Row. As part of the program, the interns will hold seminars to explain to the group both their assignments and the function of the host office.

Acceptance is based not as much on academic achievement as on a demonstrated interest in a particular subject area or career; the program has been designed to enable students to pursue their special interests while working with museum professionals.

In addition to the living allowance, interns who come from outside the Washington area will receive housing in a nearby university dormitory. The Institution will also reimburse the transportation to and from Washington.

Interns '85 will offer two separate sessions of the program: session one from June 10 through July 12 and session two from July 15 through August 16.

Applications may be requested by March 18, 1985.
