Oh, what a difference a week makes. Last week at this time, the Rice High School Raiders were coming from two straight losses to District 26-AAA foes and the future was quite bleak as far as going into the basketball playoffs was concerned.

This week, the Raiders go into week's competition—at Hallettsville this past Tuesday night and at home against Columbus on Friday night—with two victories under their belts.

A victory Friday over Columbus would virtually give the Raiders a spot in the state basketball playoffs in 3A.

Columbus defeated Rice in the first-round district outing, but Rice won over Columbus once before district play started this year.

"We've beaten Columbus once this year," Rice coach Dennis Loewe said. "And we get them

Friday night at our place, we're hoping for a win. Columbus will bring a big group of fans here Friday night, so our fans need to come out in force and back our boys," he said.

Behind undefeated Gonzales at 5-0 going into this week's play, Rice, Edna and Columbus are tied at 3-2 in district play, second place in the standings.

Hallettsville was 1-4 going into play this week and Yokum was winless in five outings.

EDNA DEFEATED

Rice won over Edna Tuesday night, 57-48.

Rice Lady Raiders remain undefeated

Throughout District 26-AAA play this week's play, the Rice Lady Raiders have blended a smothering defense, a solid bench and strong rebounding with a "family" spirit into a recipe that has produced an unblemished record.

This mixture was served in health portions last Friday night in Yokum as the Rice girls demolished the Dogs 48-22, thus perhaps stopping the Yokum girls' dreams of a fourth consecutive district championship.

Although Yokum entered the game with an impressive 17-6 record for the season, the hosts were no match for the Lady Raiders, now 18-6 on the season and 6-0 in conference play.

Rice led from the beginning as the Lady Raiders scored 12 first quarter points and limited Yokum to one basket and two free throws.

Veronica Woods got a hot hand for the Rice girls in the second frame as she netted 10 of her game high 18 points.

The Lady Raider defense continued to choke the Bulldog attack, allowing Yokum only one field goal and four free throws in the second period. Rice was leading 26-10 at half time.

With the victory Friday night, Rice came just one step closer to the state playoffs as the Lady Raiders retained their one-game lead over the Gonzales Apaches, 5-1 in

district competition going into this week's play.

The success of the Lady Raider drive to the district championship has been spearheaded by the emergence of junior Lisa Brown as the floor leader and the team's playmaker.

Woods, a junior, leads the offense with a 12.5 average, followed by freshman LaKeitha Jackson (12.0) and Karen Bluntson (10), a junior.

Defensive standout, senior Becky Kuter, joins these four to form the starting five. However, according to coach Mike Tankersley, it is the depth of the Lady Raider team that has proven a vital asset.

Contributing heavily to the success of the team are seniors Emelda Clayton, Bertie Garcia and Janet Scott and juniors LaWanda Ware and Beverly Rucka.

In a game Tuesday of last week, the Lady Raiders defeated Edna, 52-28. Woods and Jackson each scored 12 points to lead the scoring for Rice.
