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Raider boys in Bi-District playoffs

YOKUM — Coach Dusty Lowe's Rice Raiders topped the Yokum Bulldogs 71-57 here Tuesday night to take second place in the final District 25-AAA standings.

With the victory goes a berth for the Raiders in the 3A playoffs. Rice will meet the district champ in 25-3A, probably LaGrange, on a date to be announced.

Rice led Yokum all the way except late in the third period when the score was tied twice.

Donald Ray Spears scored 25 points for Rice and Nelson Dahney had 21 points.

Rice's junior varsity defeated the Yokum JV's in a preliminary contest, 74-65.

The game last Friday night was not one of the Raiders' best efforts, according to Rice coach Dusty Lowe.

"We won the game over Edna by playing defense," he said.

The Rice Raiders edged Edna's Cowboys 47-43. "Edna outplayed us offensively," the coach said. "But Rice played a little better defensively. I believe, than the Cowboys. And we had to go to full court, man-to-man defense, putting on a lot of pressure, in order to win this one," Lowe said.

The first and third quarters belonged to Edna and Rice claimed the second and fourth periods. The Raiders outscored the Cowboys 12-6 the second period and Rice outdistanced the hosts 21-12 in the final stanza.

The Raiders hit 40 percent from the line in the Edna game and Edna hit 78 percent in the field goal department.

Donald Ray Spears was the top scorer for Rice with 16, Nelson Dahney scored 15 points in the contest, and Dennis Hemphill and Malcolm Thomas each hit for six points in the game.

The playoffs route Gonzales has already sacked up the District 25-AAA championship and will represent the district as the champion in the state playoffs. The second-place team in the district also enters the playoffs.

The runner-up team will meet the winner of District 25-AAA in the bi-district contest. LaGrange is presently in the

lead in the 25-AAA standings.

Following the bi-district game, there is an area game, then a regional tournament set for Kingsville before the eventual winner at Kingsville advances to the state finals in Austin.

The state finals are scheduled to be held at Frank Erwin Center, Austin, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 7-9.

Rice freshmen undefeated. The Rice freshmen team completed the season undefeated, a historic event for a Rice team.

The 56-18 win over Edna last Friday night gave the Rice freshmen cagers an 11-0 mark for the year.
