Raider baseball opens Monday

Rice High School's baseball team was to have its first taste of competition this season on Monday, but due to wet fields in Hallettsville, Rice's scrimmage with Sacred Heart had to be cancelled.

"I'm really sorry we had to cancel that one," coach Clifton Darden said. "But it couldn't be helped."

Coach Darden is pleased with team workouts up to this point, he said. He has 16 players out this year, including three players — Malcom Thomas, Donald Ray Spears and James

Williamson — moving to baseball from the runner-up district champion Raider basketball team.

The Raider baseball team has been working out since early February and since the Hallettsville scrimmage was cancelled, the Raiders' first outing will be at Rice, 4 p.m., March 4, when Sealy comes calling.

Belville is at Rice at 4:30 p.m. on March 7 and on March 14-15-16, the Raiders will participate in a baseball tournament at Shiner. District 25-AAA competition

for the Raiders begins on April 9 at Altair when Edna visits Rice.

The Rice baseball lineup for 1985 includes: Jason Smith, catcher; Keith Pennell and Bryan Bubela, pitchers; John Adkins, first baseman; Jon Wunderlich, second base; Glen Leopold and Chad Miller, shortstops; Curt McTear and Michael Burke, third basemen; Steve Almanza and Everett Alvarado, leftfielders.

Also Kevin Long, centerfield, and Steven Drik, rightfielder.

Basketball team loses Bi-District

Rice Raider basketball coach Dusty Lowe reflected Monday on Rice's bi-district battle last Friday night with La Grange. The contest was played before a full house at Weimar High School's gymnasium.

Rice was leading the game 12-2 with 2:17 remaining in the first quarter, but La Grange came alive the last half and finally won the contest 70-56.

"They threw that press on us, and we couldn't cope with it somehow. We've had trouble with the press all year. They threw that press on us and boom! boom! it was 12-2, 12-6, and they were back in the game," Coach Lowe said.

La Grange players scored above their average for the year, he said. The Leopards hit 18 of 20 attempted free throws while the Raiders made 10 of 17 freebies in the battle.

Rice was leading 14-11 at the end of the first quarter, but by halftime, La Grange was leading 33-28. And the Leopards

were leading 53-44 by the close of the third quarter.

Nelson Dahney was the leading scorer for the Raiders as he hit for 22 points. Donald Ray Spears added 16, Malcom Thomas scored 9 and James Williamson and Dennis Hemphill had four points apiece.

The Raiders completed the

year with a 13-12 overall record, and they were 7-3 in District 26-AAA competition.

Dahney was consistently the leading scorer for Rice all year as he scored 17.8 points per game average and Spears was second, hitting for 16.7 points average per game for the season.

"In addition to tennis coaching being one of my jobs at Rice, it is also a hobby," he said.

The coach doesn't expect the tennis program at Rice to be equal to Rockdale's net program, where it is second to football, but he does expect the Rice netters to make some show this year.

This week, the coach and the team's managers are busy refurbishing the courts at Rice — the courts are in ill repair.

He expects about 20 students out for tennis when practice begins next week.

Rice's first tennis meet is at 4:15 p.m. on March 19 at Yaukum.

Loewe joins tennis team at Rice High

Dusty Lowe, head basketball coach at Rice High School, said if his Rice High School Raiders could play the La Grange Leopards 10 more games, "I believe we'd win at least nine of them."

But last Friday night, La Grange defeated the Raiders 70-56 in a bi-district game at Weimar to eliminate the Raiders from 3-A basketball playoff competition.

Coach Lowe wanted to win the game and he wanted the Raiders to advance in the cage playoffs, but if the Raiders had to lose, coach Lowe has his first sports love, tennis, to fall back on.

Loewe really likes tennis. And he is good at it. His teams at Rockdale, where he moved from to Eagle Lake, had

Rice track coach Steve Carroll said Scott owns the Rice school record in the 100 with a time of 10.64.

Juniors on this year's Rice track team include Tony Hosman, Scott, Raymond Thomas, Michael Meinke, David Morgan, Ron McGrew, Xavier Morales, Pacundo Campos.

Sophomores on the team are Jesus Hernandez, Robert Hernandez, Harold Carter, and Yell.

Freshmen on the team are Clarence Weeks, Joel Ranger.

Perdue, Louis Richardson, Douglas Tillman, Irving Williams, Kim Montgomery, James Williams, Billie King, Albert Lopez and Michael Rhodes.

Team managers are Joel Medina and Raphael Lopez.

"Sprints will be real strong individually, with Cleve Scott and Dennis Hemphill participating," coach Carroll said.

"And we will be strong depth wise in the weights," he said. Participating with weights for Rice will be Hosman, Meinke, McGrew and Rhodes, coach Carroll said.
