Overall, the budget has been based on a five or six percent increase in the cost of operating the city, including salaries, in the police department. Budgeted to operate this coming year on about \$158,000 with four officers including the chief, expenses are about \$5,000 less than the current year, which was budgeted with five officers at \$168,500.

Mayor Elmer Struss said that although four officers will not cost as much as five, the expense projection is decreased only about \$5,000 so the city

can upgrade police salaries to match the quality of the current force. The city also has budgeted \$5,000 for improvements to police headquarters, including adding space in the chief's area. However, he said most of that money will go toward roof repairs.

The police budget is included in the General Fund budget line, that does not include \$10,000 budgeted to be spent on new radio equipment. That equipment will be funded by revenue sharing money, meaning the city actually plans to spend \$188,000 on the department.

Struss said the city does not plan to employ a fifth officer, although he said Chief Ben Johnson has asked for another man, "as all good department heads ask for improvements in their departments." He said that when the city added a fifth man in the past, it was because council was not

satisfied with the department because parking meters were not being worked. Their reasoning was that a fifth man would give the department enough manpower to police the streets, and patrol the parking meters. But, it did not work out that way, Struss said, so the department was reduced to four men through attrition.

In other business, council: Approved the only bid of \$27,000 received for painting the inside and outside of the city's water tank.

Agreed to continue to participate in the Texas Municipal League's "Right" against AT&T and Southwest.

Telephone requests before the Railroad Commission for rate increases.

Learned to Struss discuss a letter he received from Southern Pacific railroad of Dallas, dated March 1, that said the officials would be here in two weeks to discuss the rail crossings at Commerce and Lake streets. However, he said, the men didn't show up.

Referred to its street and right of way committee a request by Dr. George Strathman that he be allowed to purchase the alley behind his house.

Learned the state has inspected the dog pound here and it passed with "flying colors."
