Stay alert and stay clear—

AVOID POWER LINES

Putting up the antenna for your TV set or the base station of your CB radio can be dangerous unless you take certain precautions.

Plan the project carefully if you install the antenna yourself. First, know where all the power lines are—then stay well away from them. Any contact between a power line and you or your antenna can be serious.

Make sure you locate your antenna (including the supporting mast and guy wires) at least one and a half times its total height from all power lines. For example, an antenna 30 feet high should be 45 feet away from power lines in all directions.

Don't use a ladder near power lines—during an antenna installation or while performing any other task. The danger from using a metal ladder is obvious. But a wooden ladder can conduct electricity, too, if it's damp or if it has dirt or paint on it.

Electricity brings a more comfortable life to all of us, but it must be treated cautiously. Stay alert—and stay clear of power lines!

4-H members can gain basic skills in animal production and marketing through beef, sheep and swine projects.

These projects offer learning skills and living experiences as well as a host of opportunities for education and exploration.

Specific objectives of programs in beef, sheep and swine are these:

1. To learn principles of animal science by owning, caring for and keeping records on one or more head of livestock.
2. To demonstrate a knowledge of sound breeding, feeding and management practices.
3. To identify types and grades of animals and fleece and employ efficient marketing methods.
4. To develop integrity, sportsmanship, decision making ability and public speaking skills through participation in demonstrations, tours, judging and exhibits.

5. To learn the value of scientific research in its influence upon animals and the meat and fiber industries.

6. To identify quality in wholesale and retail cuts of animals and animal products and understand their relationship to management practices.

7. To improve management skills to increase wool production and fiber quality (sheep program).

4-H youth who excel in these programs have an opportunity to capture a host of awards, including scholarships and trips to the National 4-H Congress supported by Clayton W.

Williams Jr., the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, and the Texas Pork Producers.
