law prevents collection of taxes on real property, such as your land and house, if the tax bill is more than 20 years old. And, if the tax bill is for personal property, such as your car, a taxing agency cannot file a suit for collection if the bill is older than four years.

In other business, commissioners listened to Earl Pitchford, who owns land in commissioner Jerome Wick's precinct, ask the county to work with him on a fence he built. Some of that fence is located in the county right-of-way. When the fence was built, Pitchford said, he told workmen to go around trees, rather than cut them down. Thus, in one spot, the fence encroaches the county area by 1.5 feet, and in another by 3.5 feet. No action was taken.

Took no action on an agenda item that suggested the county purchase another set of blueprints of the courthouse. Commissioner Bill Stiles said he thought the county's copy was in Austin, and could be reclaimed.

Approved spending up to \$150 for a microwave oven for the courthouse coffee room. Agreed with commissioner Otto Loessin to advertise a hearing to speed-zone Canal St. and Boulder Ave. in Garwood to 30 MPH.

Agreed to station the soon-to-be surplus Columbus ambulances unit in Weimar. Lo used as a transfer unit. That puts two county ambulances in Weimar. Eagle Lake and Columbus, and should improve service, including serving as back up units for Garwood and Sheridan.

Approved a request by Sue Ann Oil Co. to cross a county road about 1.5 miles south of Chasterville, with a pipeline. The area is in Stiles' precinct.

Approved a request by Judge Crank to travel out of state during business hours. He is one of 45 Texas officials that have been asked to participate in a three-day showing April 10-12 of the Military Airline Command's capabilities.

Acknowledged the participation of JP's Mac Jones, Mary Ordner and William Heffner in the 20-hour Justice of the Peace school March 5-8.

Approved the shift of sheriff's deputy from one pay scale to another, due to the resignation of Jim Parcel who joined the Columbus Police Force recently. Deputy James Brooks Jr. will be moved into the next highest salary level that was held by Parcel, and Bill Estling will be moved into Brook's position.

Approved a motion by Stiles that the county write State Rep. Dan Morales supporting his legislative proposals on stiffening the minimum terms that convicted felons must serve.

Gear up for spring gardening

It's time to gear up for spring vegetable garden. And two major steps are getting the right varieties and planting at the right time. Proper planting time is important if maximum quality and production are expected. Since such warm-season crops as tomatoes, peppers, corn, eggplants, beans, squash, cucumbers, okra, watermelon, sweet potatoes, pumpkins, and cantaloupes are sensitive to cold temperatures and can be killed by even the lightest frost, gardeners must be aware of the average date of the last frost for their particular areas.

It's also wise to wait until the soil has warmed before planting seeds of warm-season crops. Soil temperature at planting depth should be in the upper 60s or in the 70s to increase seed germination and insure a good stand. Some vegetable crops are cold-hardy and can tolerate light frosts or freezes. These include beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, peas, lettuce, onion, parsley, radishes, spinach, cauliflower, collards, mustard, kale and turnips. These can be planted in late winter or early spring.

Planting the best adapted varieties that are available in this can mean the difference between gardening success and failure. For further information on growing a successful spring vegetable garden, contact the County Extension Office.

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
