These forces have caused the baccalaureate degree to become a specialist degree rather than a generalist degree. Mr. Matthews summed up today's baccalaureate degree by saying that although it is no longer the magic key to success there remains no substitute, because it is the beginning of every

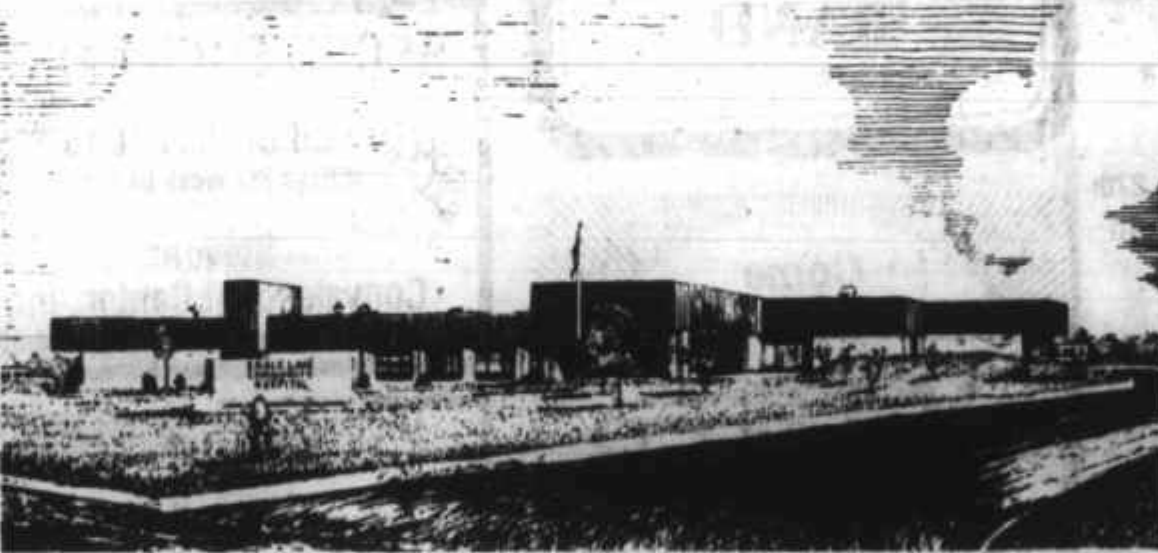
