Museum Notes

I hope you can plan on a long leisurely stroll through our Prairie Edge Museum. However, if your time for a visit is quite limited, I suggest that you head for the long display case located near the wall to your right if you enter by the Main Street door. This case contains many treasures that are gifts or loans from Ruth Burger Boethel, now of Beville but formerly of Eagle Lake. Some of the treasures are as follows:

1. A turkey feather fan that is at least 100 years old.
2. Two napkin rings made by a relative of Ruth who was a tinsmith.
3. A crocheted baby cap and drawstring crocheted bag made by Ruth's grandmother Rachel Kister about 75 years ago.
4. A flower-decorated oil lamp which was probably bought in 1904.
5. A dolly, handkerchief, and table cover with exquisite handwork including tatting and drawn work. These were the work of Rachel Kister.
6. Wearing apparel including a child's dress that is about 95 years old.
7. A pin cushion covered with velvet and beads that is about 100 years old.
8. A glass spoon holder and glass pitcher that are at least 70 years old.
9. A framed picture of the 1915 First Grade class taught by Lucy Hart, the twin sister of the late Lela Chumney.

On the wall back of the case are framed pictures showing the following:

1. The interior of the Burger Brothers Store which was located on the site of Miller's Grocery. In the same frame are also offering bargains. This store remained open until midnight on Saturdays and gave free delivery service.

2. Part of the old Kallison hotel and the Burger livery stable.

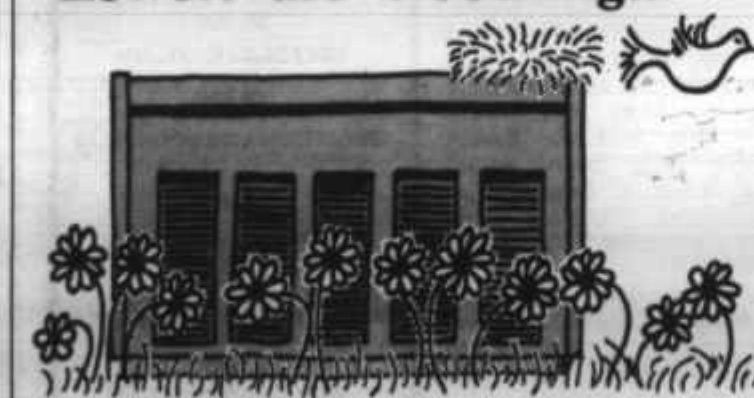

The Dilue Rose Harris Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas met on April 18 at 7 p.m. in the home of Mrs. Millycent Crane. Guest hostesses were Mrs. Isabel Mueller and Mrs. Alice Tait.

The chapter gave a set of Six Flags over Texas to St. Anthony's seventh grade class in recognition of their completion of the Texas History Project.

The members voted to donate a book to each of the junior high schools in the county.

The installation of officers was conducted by Mrs. Jeanie Mahon and Mrs. Kitty Gunn. The officers for the next two years are: Mrs. Millycent Crane, president; Mrs. Julia Collins, vice president; Mrs. Mary Frances Girard, secretary; Mrs. Kathryn Gunn, treasurer; Mrs. Margurite Fitzpatrick, chaplain; Mrs. Susan Rogers, registrar; Mrs. Grace Yoder, historian, and Mrs. Sue Imbomne, custodian.

The speaker was Doctor Patrick J. Wagner of Shiner. Doctor Wagner's program was entitled "The History and Discovery of the Gonzales 'Come and Take It' Cannon of 1835." The cannon that fired the first shot for Texas Independence was at Gonzales on October 2, 1835. This cannon was loaned to the Gonzales in 1831 by the Mexican Government for protection against the Tonkawa Indians. In late September, 1835, Santa Anna ordered Col. Ugartechea, commandant at San Antonio to return the cannon to the Mexican Army at San Antonio. The request was refused by 18 Gonzales men on the east bank of the Guadalupe. The cannon had been buried in a peach orchard. It was dug up from its hiding place and mounted on the axle of a cotton wagon. Sarah Seely and Evaline DeWitt took a wedding dress and stitched it into a white flag bearing a black star, a cannon and the words "Come and Take It."

On October 1, 1835, the Texans number 100 under the command of Col. John H. Moore of La Grange crossed the Guadalupe and in a desperate battle the next morning shot the cannon fired a charge of pieces of chain, scraps scattering the Mexicans in retreat to San Antonio. The Texas Revolution had begun.

The cannon was taken back to Gonzales where it was repaired and mounted on a four-wheel carriage and limber drawn by two yoke of oxen.
