Public Utility Commission grants CPL refund request

The Public Utility Commission recently granted Central Power and Light Company's request to refund over-collected fuel charges to its customers. The amount ordered refunded will be approximately \$31.2 million, including interest, through February 1985. Additionally, an expected final order from the commission on a disputed \$28 million in fuel costs could increase the refund amount.

Checks will be sent to all customers receiving \$10 or more. Customers receiving less than \$10 will have a credit applied to their electric bill. CPL will make a good faith effort to locate customers who have moved out of its service area and are due refunds.

According to Charles Garrett, CPL local manager, it will take the company approximately two months to review customer records, calculate the refund due, and mail checks to the majority of its 500,000 customers in South Texas. The amount refunded will be based on how much electricity a customer used since October 1983.

Using a method prescribed by the commission has caused the company's fuel revenues to exceed expenses. That method established a fixed factor for fuel charges which can be changed only with PUC approval. The company has been able to take advantage of the softer fuel market and purchase gas at a price below its commission-prescribed factor.

CPL first requested the PUC's approval to lower the fuel portion of customer's bills in early December 1984. The company also requested authorization to refund fuel over-recoveries.

The company had proposed December 28 as the effective date for the rate reduction. A ruling by the PUC in January approved the lower fuel factor. As a result of that request, CPL customers saw a 6 percent drop in their electric bill in February. Today, almost five months after the company's initial refund request, the commission ruled on the refund method.

Based on last year's average residential usage figures, CPL estimates customers who used between 700 to 1,000 kilowatt hours per month during the last 18 months will receive checks of approximately \$53 to \$71, respectively. These figures are based on the best available information. They will be adjusted to reflect the terms and conditions of the commission's final order, Garrett said.

Upper coast crops tour set June 19

Farmers in the Upper Coast area of Texas, plagued by late plantings due to extensive rain, will get a review of the crop situation and timely production tips at a field day next month.

June 19 has been set as the date for the Upper Coast Crops Field Day and Tour, with Jackson County hosting the event this year.

Registration will begin about 8 p.m. at the Jackson County Services Building in Edna, announces Marvin Leskar, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Extension service and the Jackson County Crops Committee are planning the event.

Tours of a number of field demonstrations in Jackson County will be featured along with several brief presentations on crop production.

"Our crops are extremely late this year," says Leskar. "We're as much as 60 days late in some locations; some farmers just finished planting corn."

However, Leskar points out that the late planting season and unusual planting situations will provide an opportunity to get some valuable data from field demonstrations. "Planting times vary greatly across the county, and we should be able to get some good data on crop performance this year," he notes.

The annual field day rotates among Fort Bend, Jackson, Matagorda and Wharton counties.

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
