Last week, Tuesday's action went about as expected with the Yanks downing the Cubs 14-8 and the Pirates clubbing the Dodgers 12-6.

Powers then got Gonzalo Delagarda on a called 3rd strike to end the rally.

In the bottom of the first the Yanks raged back sending 12 batters to the plate and scoring 6 runs. The last three on a well hit drive to right by Chad Sunderman.
