However, Friday was the second time in two weeks that Pooh Norris gave the audience something quite unusual in Little League Ball. He hit another pitch over the second fence in dead center field. When Norris came up to bat the next time, the Cubs thought it best he be given an intentional walk. That strategy proved a problem, however, as Norris scored on successive walks to Todd Mascheck, Rich Beth, Jamie Green and Marcus York.

Kevin Diggins also cleared

the fence in the first inning on a two-strike, one-ball pitch. The winning pitcher on Friday was Kevin Williams now showing a record of 2-1, and on Tuesday it was Reggie Doner, who sports an undefeated 2-0 record.

The two games between the Pirates and Yanks proved to be much more exciting. Tuesday, the Pirates started out with five hits and seven runs in the first inning. But, the scrappy Yanks put together two hits and two bases on balls with two Pirate errors to score five runs of their own. In the second, the Pirates took advantage of one hit, a hit batsman and two Yank errors to score four more.

In the bottom of the second, the Yanks scored 5 runs on hits by John Gonzales and Lewis Camajo, plus a walk to Wilson, and a ground-rule double by Turner. In the top of the third, the Pirates didn't score while the Yanks combined hits by Wilson, Powers and Turner to collect three more runs making the score 13-10 Yanks going into the fourth.

The Pirates scored three on a triple by Kerry Sims, a walk to Weeks and an error to Deshawn Cotton. The Yanks roared back in the bottom half of the 4th on a single to Wilson, a double to Powers

and Turner, a walk to Matt Gunn, a hit batsman Andres Cruz, a single to John Gonzales, other walks, then a game-winning hit by Ramos Pantoja. The Yanks were victorious 16-14. The winning pitcher was Matt Wilson and the loser was Chris Weeks.

The Pirate-Yank game on Friday turned into a real barn burner for both players and officials. The Yanks led off with one run on a walk to Sunderman and a double to Powers. The Pirates scored on a pass to Kerry Sims who took second, third then home on passed balls.

In the second Turner led off with a ground-rule double that stuck in the fence. It fooled most of the spectators who thought he had homered, to right. Next, Camajo reached first on an error by the second baseman. Andres Cruz walked then Everitt Ramirez singled scoring Turner, Camajo and Cruz.

Pat Powers gave his parents and the fans some anxious moments when he singled and tried to stretch it to a double. As he slid into second he jammed his right foot into the base and twisted his ankle. Fortunately he was able to continue although slightly hobbled.

The Pirates scrambled back in their half of the second af-

ter Cotton popped up to first and Chris Weeks fanned. Scott Garrett reached first on a fumble by the first baseman then Coldewey walked, Jackson singled and Pat Weeks reached first on an error by the second baseman. At that point, the score was 5-4 after two innings.

After three innings, the score was 7-5 Yanks. The Pirates scored one in the bottom of the fourth when Coldewey walked and scored on an extremely strong hit by Kerry Sims. The ball appeared to be an inside-the-park homer, knotting the score at 7. However, after an appeal by coach Powers, that the ball had stuck in the fence, Sims was returned to second. But another appeal, this one by coach Powell, over-ruled the first and Sims' hit then was scored as a home run. A counter-appeal by Coach Powers at 2nd produced Umpire Eslinbaum calling Sims out at second for missing the base, then ex-coach Blair and Coach Powell appealed again since Wilson had not appealed properly, Sims was returned to second base but the next batter was retired and the game ended with the Yanks winning 7-6. The winner was Shawn Turner and the loser was Ernest Sims.

Proceeds of the golf tournament and plate lunches are for the benefit of the Knights of Columbus land improvement.

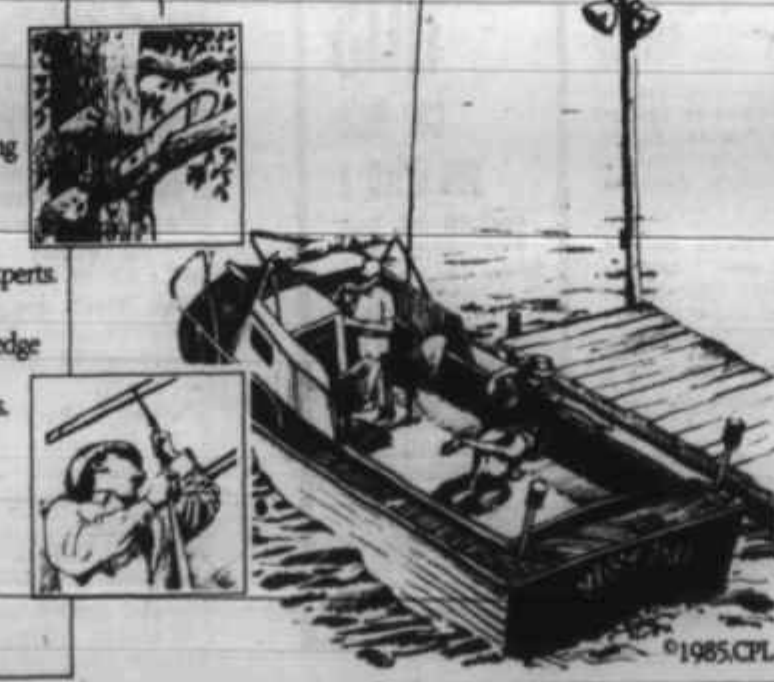
Take care when you're boating: Power lines could be there

Anytime you're launching your boat or transporting it over land, check carefully to make sure you avoid all electrical facilities. Metal sailboat masts, outriggers, power boat antennas and other high-rising equipment become deadly conductors of electricity the moment they come in contact with overhead lines. Careless handling of a boat near a power line can endanger your life—and the lives of everyone else nearby.

Play it safe, too, when you're handling chores around the house.

- Don't trim or fell trees near power lines. This is work best left to experts.
- Keep ladders and other tall devices away from overhead lines.
- Don't install an outside antenna unless you have the proper knowledge and equipment; have a qualified technician handle the job.

And remember that fallen power lines are extremely dangerous. If you see a downed line, call Central Power and Light Company, then stay away from the line and keep others away.



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
