Coby Shorter addressed members attending FFA state convention

America's largest Future Farmers of America state convention got underway July 10, when more than 5,000 members and guests attended the opening session of the 57th annual convention of the Texas FFA in the Astroarena, Houston.

Coby Shorter III, state FFA president from Rice Consolidated FFA chapter, presided at the general sessions, which began at 9 a.m. July 10. Scheduled to address the convention are nationally known motivational speakers Dan Baker and Mark Scharenbroich.

The convention is the culmination of a year's activity for America's largest FFA state membership. With more than 900 FFA chapters and in excess of 55,000 members, Texas ranks first in FFA membership and is sectioned into 10 regional areas. Texas also boasts more than half a million former FFA members.

The FFA is made up of students who study vocational agriculture in public schools in preparation for an agricultural career. The ultimate objective

of FFA is to produce future leaders for American agriculture to help with the vital role of producing food and fiber.

Highlights of the three-day convention will include the election of state officers and the presentation of awards, including \$825,000 in college scholarships. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo will present 50, four-year, \$5,000 college scholarships to outstanding FFA members of July 11, as part of the convention activities. The Show awards \$400,000 in scholarships to top FFA members as part of its annual scholarship program.

The theme for the 1985 convention is "Keep Agriculture No. 1 - Support FFA and Vocational Agriculture." During the convention, the 1,600 voting delegates will elect the 1985-86 state president and the state sweetheart from nominees from the 10 regional areas. The Outstanding Public Speaker in Texas will be chosen to represent Texas in competition at the national convention in Kansas City, Mo. this fall.

The Farris 1912 named in touring directory of historical structures

Texas is a vast country with an intriguing and diverse heritage. Visiting historical sites within the state can be a fun summer vacation or an enjoyable weekend excursion.

Thanks to a new touring directory, "A Guidebook to Restaurants, Hotels and Theatres in Historic Structures," vacationers and weekenders can discover the Lone Star state's nostalgic and colorful past while eating, sleeping and being entertained

in authentic, restored and replicated historical buildings. Hays and Bill Farris' historical hotel and restaurant, The Farris 1912, a vintage Victorian rural hotel filled with period antiques and original furniture, is among the many listed in the directory.

Published by the Texas Historical Foundation, the book is a source and passport to the uniquely preserved buildings currently in use as restaurants, hotels and theatres. It affords travelers the opportunity to explore the hospitality of pioneer outposts, rural cafes, opera houses and luxury hotels of the 19th Century.

Over 500 establishments were included which offer a sampling of authentic Texas culture through their architecture, endurance, association with a famous event or person, or embodiment of local color where a sense of community and authentic atmosphere can be absorbed. Theatres which stage annual productions depicting local or state history were also included.

To further spotlight Texas heritage, a listing of top historical sites and shrines provides the location of places every native and traveler should visit in order to appreciate and understand the state's development and unique aura.

Entries in the directory were identified by local and state public officials, historical groups, civic clubs and tourism experts. They were compiled into a purse or pocket size booklet convenient for travel.

The publication is offered free to the public due to the sponsorship of six public spirited Texas corporations, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Texas, Dr. Pepper, Exxon, Lone Star Brewery, Southwestern Bell Telephone and Texas Commerce Bancshares. The research was made possible by a grant from the Hobbitt Foundation of Dallas.
