County Agent's Notebook

Keep grass clippings for compost

Instead of throwing away grass clippings when you mow your lawn, put them to use in a compost pile.

Compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material.

Make the compost pile 4 to 6 feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available.

The simplest composting method is to alternate 4 to 6 inch layers of plant matter, such as leaves or grass, with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface should form a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer.

Water the pile thoroughly when completed. Add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy. Leaves decompose slowly if too dry.

Turn the compost every three to four months to aerate the material and speed decomposition. Within six months to a year, your compost will be ready to use and you'll be glad you saved those grass clippings.

Last year for energy tax credit

This last year that taxpayers may claim the residential energy tax credit is the last. A tax credit of up to \$300 is available for energy conservation materials installed in the home, with a separate credit of up to \$4,000 for taxpayers who install "renewable" energy source such as solar or wind equipment.

The credit for energy conservation materials is figured at 15 percent for the first \$2,000 spent on such items as storm or thermal windows and doors, insulation, weather-stripping and caulking. Also qualifying are certain fuel saving heating system modifications. Only materials installed in homes that were built before April 20, 1977, are eligible for energy credit.

The "renewable" energy source credit is 40 percent of the first \$10,000 invested in qualifying solar, wind, or geothermal equipment used to heat or cool or to provide hot water for use in the home.

Both credits are available for items purchased and installed on a taxpayer's principal residence between April 20, 1977, and December 31, 1985. The "renewable" energy credit is available for both existing and newly constructed homes. Renters as well as homeowners are eligible for the credit.

If your home is air conditioned, your cooling system uses more than half the electricity you buy every summer—so direct most of your efforts toward making that system more efficient.

Here are some steps you can take to reduce energy use.

- Have a qualified technician check and check your air conditioner preferably before the hot season starts.
- Set the thermostat at 78°.
- Clean or replace the filter at least once a month. Clear obstructions away from the outside unit.

- Eliminate air leaks. Wall light switch outlets and plug-in sockets allow a surprising amount of costly air infiltration. Seal them with the inexpensive gaskets you can buy at most hardware stores. Caulk all cracks and holes. Install weather stripping around windows and doors.

• Keep direct sunlight out of the house with shades, awnings, draperies or blinds. Plant trees and shrubs for additional shade.

• Use your electric fans to stay comfortable with the thermostat at a higher setting.

If you're in the market for a new air conditioner, select a model with an Energy Efficiency Ratio of 8 or higher—and make sure the unit is correctly sized for your home.
