The award is in recognition of her twenty years dedication and service to the teaching profession.

Ms. Wunderlich and Ms. Jewel Coreathers participated in a three and one-half day State Inservice Conference for the professional development of vocational home economics teachers.

The conference, arranged and planned by the home economics education division of the Texas

Education Agency, will be highlighted by 16 special interest sessions offering a diversity of subjects to expand the teaching skills of vocational home economics. Some of the sessions included in the conference, which were presented by national business authorities and educators, included such topics as: priorities affecting home economics education; the role of computers in home economics education; training for business and community leadership; preparing students for the role of wage earner in a free enterprise; and increasing teaching effectiveness in consumer and homemaking education. All sessions provided an opportunity for home economics educators to integrate new knowledge and instructional techniques into the classroom.

VHETAT president Dorothy Vack said the professional improvement conference was approved for advanced academic credit for career ladder purposes for the 1985-86 school year and the format of this year's meeting was designed to meet the criteria set forth by the State Board of Education.

Approximately 3,000 teachers attended the conference.

Start thinking about winter pastures

Hot, dry and dusty days during summer can cause one to wonder if wintertime will ever come. But this is the time to make plans for winter pastures.

Early planning is one of the secrets for productive winter pastures, so prepare seedbeds early and have soil tested to determine the amount of nutrients needed for abundant growth.

Winter pastures should be planted by September 15 in the Colorado County. Be sure to use an adapted variety and one with disease resistance.

Growers are often concerned about the fall armyworm and other insects that can damage winter pastures. However, these insects can be controlled easily, economically and safely with approved pesticides.

Results of demonstrations to sow adapted varieties and best practices for growing winter pastures in Colorado County are available from the county Extension office in Columbus.

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Views On Dental Health

IMMEDIATE DENTURES

One of the commonest mistakes of modern dentistry is the "immediate denture". These are constructed BEFORE all remaining natural teeth are removed and inserted as soon as the final teeth are extracted. Naturally, they will need some adjustments as your swollen gums recede back to normal, but it's a darn sight better than facing the public with no teeth while your dentures are being constructed in the laboratory.

In this procedure, the back teeth are removed but the front teeth are allowed to remain. When the gums are healed, impressions are taken with the front teeth still in place and dentures are prepared. When the day of receding arrives, the front teeth are removed but the back teeth remain. These are then inserted into the dentures.
