Rice District enrollment down as school starts for another year

Except for the usual first-day confusion, Rice District schools had a smooth opening day Tuesday.

The Rice school district still is the largest in the county, but enrollment for the first day was about 50 students below last year's October 1 state reporting date, but Supt. Harold King said he expected 30 to 40 more students. "They all never come on the first day," he said after schools had closed for the day.

Weimar Schools also showed a decline, but Columbus Schools reported the county's only increase. In Weimar, there were 18 fewer students than last year, while in Columbus, there were 75 more students.

Here are the enrollment

reports for the Rice Schools, with the school listed first, this year's enrollment and last year's enrollment:

Garwood school, 146, 152; Sheridan school, 152, 135; Eagle Lake Primary, 396, 400; Eagle Lake Middle, 406, 440; and Rice High School, 454, 473.

Total enrollment for Rice this year is 1,554. Last year at the October reporting period, the district enrollment was 1,600, showing a 1985-86 decrease of 46 students. King said he thinks that by October Rice district enrollment will be only about one percent down from last year. Earlier this summer, the administration had predicted a growth of about 50 students.

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Wintermann collection added to Houston Museum of Fine Arts

The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, has recently acquired sixty-two 19th and 20th century American paintings, a gift from David and Eula Goss Wintermann of Eagle Lake. According to museum director Peter C. Marzio, "The importance of the Wintermann Collection is that it strengthens the area of American realist art from 1875 to 1925, and adds both depth and breadth to our holdings."

The Wintermann Collection features works by "The Eight", a group of American realist painters who, in rejecting traditional European notions of high art, introduced a new vitality to American art, often painting the more common scenes of everyday life. Included in the group are Arthur B. Davies, William Glackens, Robert Henri, Ernest Lawson,

George Luks, Maurice Prendergast, Everett Shinn and John Sloan.

Additional highlights of the Collection include paintings by George Bellows, Emil Carlsen, Frederick Frieseke, Childs Hassam, George Inness and Edward Potthast.

The collection of paintings, as a whole, displays a tremendous variety of theme and style. Subject matter ranges from rural landscapes and coastal seascapes to big city scenes; styles vary from dreamily impressionistic to brutally realistic.

Representing thirty years of dedicated collecting, the Wintermann Collection reflects a defined interest in and support of 19th and 20th century American art. "We felt that the French artists, especially the Impressionists, already had a great deal of attention. The American Impressionists did not, especially not here in Texas," state Mrs. Wintermann.

The Wintermanns began collecting the paintings in the 1930's. The sixty-two paintings given to the museum include four paintings given last year

— works by William Merritt Chase, Edward Potthast, John Sloan and Grandma Moses.

When asked why they decided to give their collection to the Houston museum, Mrs. Wintermann responded, "I'm a native Houstonian. I remember when The Museum of Fine Arts opened. Besides that," added Mr. Wintermann, "we both wanted to keep the Collection in Texas."

Selections from the Wintermann Collection will be on view in the museum's Arnold Gallery beginning September 17.
