High electricity use recorded

Central Power and Light Co. customers set two new records for electrical use on Monday, August 26. On that day the average high temperature across CPL's South Texas service area was 100 degrees.

The first record was set at 4 p.m. when peak demand reached 5,522 megawatts. Total consumption for the day reached 58,559,000 kilowatt-hours, also a record for one day's use.

"August and September are our hottest months and traditionally when new records are set," Charles Garrett, CPL's local manager, said. "That's because there is a direct relationship between cumulative hot weather and energy use."

In addition to higher temperatures, there are more people at home during August enjoying school holidays and vacations. "There are more people opening the refrigerator and freezer, more clothes to clean, and usually an increase in hot water use, and extensive use of air conditioning," Garrett said.

Monday was only the second time in the company's history that demand topped 3,000 megawatts. The first time was 3,002 megawatts set August 8. Prior to that, CPL's peak demand record was 2,869, set in 1983. That peak was broken 21 times between July 29 and August 27.

In addition to the string of peak records, 20 daily consumption records have been set since July 29. This record-setting trend follows unseasonably mild temperatures during most of July, when the average residential-customer actually

used less electricity than last year.

CPL customers, on the average, paid 13 percent less for their electricity in July 1985 than they did in July 1984. The reduction is partially due to the mild temperatures, but also was a result of the utility's efforts to negotiate lower fuel prices, thereby reducing the fuel factor portion of the customer's bill.

"To get the maximum benefit from every dollar spent on energy, customers are welcome to pick up tips and information at the office on McCarty Street in Eagle Lake," said Garrett.

The information available includes booklets like "Residential Energy Management Checklist," "111 Ways to Control Your Electric Bill" and "How to Save Money on Your Air Conditioning."

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Obituaries

Roland J. Campbell

The community learned with sadness of the death of Roland J. Campbell, 62, of Hallettsville, owner of the former Dr. Pepper Bottling Co. which was located in Eagle Lake. He died on September 1 at the Eagle Lake Community Hospital 10:45 p.m. after a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were conducted at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, September 4 from the First United Methodist Church of Hallettsville with Rev. Bernard Ritchie officiating. Graveside services and burial was at Lakeside Cemetery in Eagle Lake with flag flying at half-staff and presentation ceremonies under the auspices of VFW Post No. 8783.

He was born on April 29, 1923 in Eagle Lake, a son of the late Howard Jones "H.J." and Millie Holmstrom Campbell. He lived in the Eagle Lake area most of his life, moving to Hallettsville in 1972. He married Betty Wood on February 15, 1948 at the Colby Memorial Methodist Church in Eagle Lake. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Hallettsville serving on the board of trustees.

During World War II, he entered the service in April 1943 with the Army Air Corps and piloted a B-24 Liberator Bomber named "Patches" attached to the 44th Bomb Group, 2nd Air Division of the 8th Air Force based in Tibenham, England where he flew 20 bombing missions over Germany. Mr. Campbell's great concern was for the country he loved and fought for and for the welfare of his family and friends.

He went into business following World War II with the Dr. Pepper Bottling Co. of Eagle Lake with his father, H.J. Campbell. Through purchasing other operations, the company evolved into what is now Better Beverages, Inc. He was chairman of the Board of Better Beverages, Inc.

He was preceded in death by his parents; two brothers, Overton and Melvin Campbell, and his sister, Mrs. Mabel Ware.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. R.J. "Betty" Campbell of Hallettsville; three sons, Dale Campbell and wife, Lynda, of

Victoria, Alan Campbell and wife, Sandra, of Hallettsville, Dean Campbell of Ball Lake City, Utah; grandchildren, Amy and Ned Campbell of Victoria, and Rose and Russell Campbell of Hallettsville; and numerous nieces, nephews and relatives and a host of loved ones and many friends.
