Candlelight ceremony unites Lloyd, Botard

On Saturday, June 29, the historic Zion Lutheran Church in Sublime, was the setting of a candlelight ceremony uniting Kathryn Lloyd and Warren Botard in marriage. Pastor Albert Flatman performed the double-ring ceremony.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Lloyd of Sheridan. The groom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Albert Botard, also of Sheridan.

LaVerne Chovanetz, organist, played various pre-nuptial music, and the traditional wedding processional and recessional. Carol Drost, sister of the groom, also played several pre-nuptial selections, and accompanied Aileen Peck, the groom's sister, as she sang "To Me" before the ceremony, and "Walk Hand in Hand" after the wedding vows.

The center of the altar was decorated with a large arrangement of white gladioli, blue and white daisies, and fresh greenery. The antique brass altar urn held matching spring flowers. An assortment of green potted plants decorated the sanctuary and church annex. Family pews were marked with white satin bows.

The bride was escorted to the altar by her brother, Michael, where she was met and given in marriage by her parents. For her wedding, the bride selected a formal designer gown of white silk organza and Venice lace. The fitted lace bodice, accented with tiny bridal pearls, featured a sheer yoke framed with an off-the-shoulder ruffle, and rose to form a sculptured portrait neckline. 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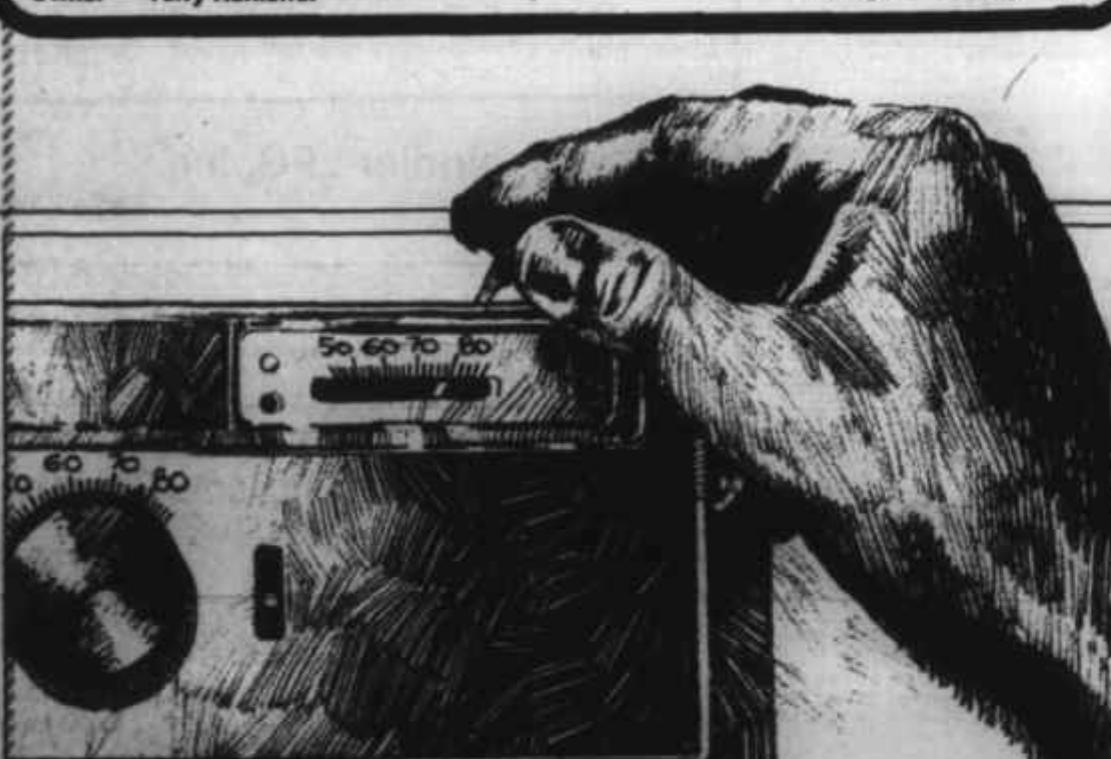

If you would agree that Ma Ferguson was a famous Texan or that Jose Antonio Navarro brought in the first Texas oil well, you may need a Lone Star history refresher course.
