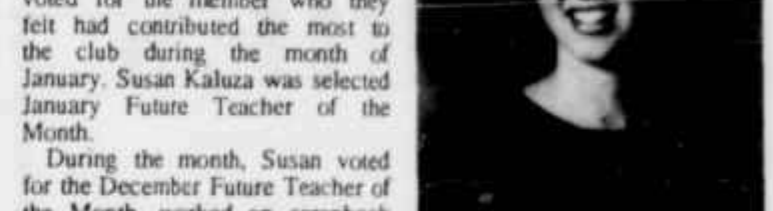
Susan Kaluza selected January FTA'er

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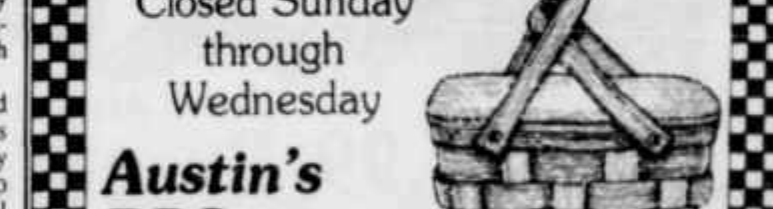
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Take care when you're at the wheel: Power lines could be there

Electricity must be treated with caution—especially when you're using any kind of equipment that requires you to work close to overhead power lines. Make sure you have enough clearance when you're carrying a tall pole or pipe on a tractor—or driving a truck with a raised bed—or operating machinery such as cranes, drilling rigs, cotton module builders, hay balers, and other big equipment.

Don't forget for a moment that the power lines could be there. And don't just assume that clearance is adequate: be sure. One careless move can endanger your life and that of anyone near you.

Remember, too, that fallen power lines are extremely dangerous. If you see a downed line, call CPL immediately. Then stay away from the wire and everything it touches—and keep others away.



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
