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Speaks out at banquet Price urges Black community to become a cohesive unit

At least 350 people attended Saturday night's sixth annual Black Heritage Banquet in Columbus, hearing speaker John Wiley Price, Dallas County Commissioner, urge the Black community, to not forget its 400 year history, and the events that have brought them to the present. He spoke without reservation, and cited several examples of history that he thinks many people have forgotten, and others he said they probably don't know.

The program, with Mrs. Lucille Chase as mistress of ceremonies, included entertainment from The Children of Faith, a singing group from Austin that rivals professional groups which record modern religious music. The audience was called on to sing and young George Bratcher led a salute to the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King.

After Price spoke, John H. Jimmy Axel also told the audience they need to become a more cohesive family unit. He recalled that when he was in the public school system, and a youngster did something wrong even if it was a minor infraction of a parent's rule, and an adult member of the community saw you, that adult punished you for it, then called your parents. When you got home, Axel said, you got punished again. That doesn't happen today, but it needs to, he added.

Also, the program included recognition of special guests, which included many of the men and women who are candidates in the May primary election, as well as county judge Lester Crane, commissioner Otto Loessin, Sheriff Jim Brossard and Richard Schmidt, justice of the peace in Columbus.

Price pointed out, saying that the Gramm-Rudman Act will remove \$13 billion from the budget this year, and \$30 billion next year. "And they (the politicians) are going to balance the budget on our backs," unless we express ourselves by voting. Every person in this room should "arm themselves with a voter registration card, and exercise that right to vote."

"Twenty years ago we fought for the right to vote," Price said, "and we had people dying" to vote. But today there seems to be too much apathy to use that right. Have you forgotten what it was like before Blacks could vote, where were the literacy tests that asked such questions as "How many pounds of cheese are there in the moon?"

Schools teach history, he said, but it is "his-story" referring to the white-controlled establishment. You, therefore, have been mis-educated. Law, he said, says that if you are a one-sixteenth Black, you are a Black person. Using that guideline he quoted from a book by J.A. Rodgers that reveals five American presidents then are Black.

As he continued his remarks, strongly detailing other issues in Black history, he said, "I see some of you are getting uneasy. But I'm not talking about hate and violence, I'm talking about love...you have to love yourself" and have self respect before you can ask for respect and love from others. The Black community needs to develop more of that, he said.

He challenged the audience to continue its growth in this world. "It's fashionable" to be active in celebrating February as Black History Month, but what about the other 11 months?
