Take care when you're boating: Power lines could be there

Anytime you're launching your boat or transporting it over land, check carefully to make sure you avoid all electrical facilities. Metal sailboat masts, outriggers, power boat antennas and other high-rising equipment become deadly conductors of electricity the moment they come in contact with overhead lines. Careless handling of a boat near a power line can endanger your life—and the lives of everyone else nearby.

Play it safe, too, when you're handling chores around the house. • Don't trim or fell trees near power lines. This is work best left to experts. • Keep ladders and other tall devices away from overhead lines. • Don't install an outside antenna unless you have the proper knowledge and equipment; have a qualified technician handle the job. • And remember that fallen power lines are extremely dangerous. If you see a downed line, call Central Power and Light Company, then stay away from the line and keep others away.
