Mayor, council, school positions on ballot

Street, airport issues valued at 79-cents weekly

The most active city election in 24 years will be over this Saturday as Eagle Lake voters have the opportunity to go to the polls and elect a new mayor and fill two city council seats.

Also on the ballot will be two tax bond proposals dealing with improvements to the city's street system and airport.

Also, voters throughout southern Colorado County will be asked to go to the polls to stamp their approval on the only two candidates seeking the two seats available on the Rice Consolidated Independent School District board of trustees.

Unless some write-in activity comes out of the blue, John Matthews will fill the seat held by board president Steve Balas, who chose not to run again, and Natalie Dupre will be elected to a full three

year term. She was elected to the board a year ago to fill an unexpired term. School district voters can vote at the Eagle Lake Community Center, or Garwood or Sheridan schools, depending on their address.

Mayor's race
In Eagle Lake, voters officially have a choice of two candidates. Lanny D. Powers and Roy D. Van

Struss, who was elected Mayor in April of 1970, did not file as a candidate and has continued to claim he is not seeking office, there is some small movement to have him re-elected on a write-in basis. Struss has said he would accept the job, again, if he received the most votes.

In a city the size of Eagle Lake, under Texas general law city rules, there will be no runoff election. The

person who receives the most vote on April 5th will become mayor. When Struss was first elected in 1970, 576 people voted, and Struss drew 63 percent (364 votes) of those. His opponents were Van Nort who received 133 votes, and Garner H. Tate who received 47 votes.

According to a story in the April 1970 issue of The Headlight, the voter turnout was the heaviest the city had received in many, many years. In 1960 560 people voted and in 1978, there were 553 votes cast.

According to a study of the names and addresses of current registered voters in voting Precinct 17, which covers a large segment of the southeastern part of the county from Interstate 10 to the Wharton County line east of the Colorado River, there are an estimated 1300 voters in Eagle Lake. Approximately 170 are hispanic, 365 are black and 750 are white.

As of Tuesday afternoon, 22 absentee votes were cast. Tuesday was the last day for absentee voting unless of extreme emergency.

Lucille Perry at the municipal building is the absentee voting judge.

Council candidates
The two council seats open now are held by mayoral candidate Van Nort, and by Vic Corns. Corns is seeking re-election, and has competition from Peggy Byrn, Case Hollub and Candy McCreary.

The two candidates with the most votes will be elected.

Campaign activity
The last several weeks have been

active for candidates, especially those seeking the mayor's office. Powers and his family have been knocking on doors asking for voter support and have organized a telephone bank for this weekend. Van Nort has been active in talking to voters also. Both have used the mails and the newspaper to sway voters. Van Nort has been campaigning on his experience as a councilman, and Powers has called for a different direction for the city in the future. Both said they approve of the airport and street bond issues.

However, there is no clear cut "leader" going down to the wire, so everyone will have to wait until the polls close at 7 p.m. to learn the results.

Street, airport issues
The two bond issues valued at 79-cents a week.

To make the election even more interesting, voters are being asked to choose whether they are for or against street and airport improvements. City Council is asking voters to decide whether \$350,000 in street and drainage work should be done, and whether \$250,000 should be spent lengthening the Municipal Airport runway.

Those who have spoken up for both issues include the Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Foundation and Revitalize Eagle Lake. The work of those groups is to increase economic activity to improve job opportunities. A letter from the Chamber board was sent to members asking their support, and a joint letter signed by board members of all three groups was mailed to registered

voters last week asking for voter approval.

Generally, proponents of the issues seek the improvements to help create opportunities for future growth.

Opponents of the issues, including at least one elected city official who was instrumental in seeing the issue was on the ballot this Saturday, are against the issues because they also oppose tax increases. They have continually said a 40-plus percent increase in the tax rate is too much. However, as has been pointed out in The Headlight, the increase is less than 79-cents a week for owners of homes valued at \$30,000. If your home is valued at a lower amount, the increase is even less.

Estimates are guesses
The estimates used to project tax rate increases have been at the maximum amount, with "what if..." information provided by the city's bond attorney. Other factors will decrease the rate hike. One is the bond market itself. Interest rates have continued to decline, and the lower the interest, the lower the tax rate. Also, county commissioner Bill Stiles has promised to provide a major part of the workmanship in the lengthening and construction of the runway portion of the airport improvements. If that happens, then it is likely that \$100,000 of the airport bonds never will be spent, thereby keeping the tax increase low.

Second annual chicken spaghetti supper April 14

Proceeds from the dinner help the club fund community activities that directly benefit Eagle Lake and the surrounding area, specifically their Lifeline program that allows elderly people to continue living in their homes with the comfort of knowing that a summons for help is only a push of a button away.

This is the second year for the dinner. It will be held in the Eagle Lake community center from 5 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 14. Tickets are \$3.75 per person.

The sale starts at 8 a.m. both days. The Museum is on Main St.
