These were written by Mary Carolyn Nash Stoddard of Dallas and our own hard-working Paulette Balasek Klockman of Eagle Lake. I had the privilege of teaching both of these fine young women English when they were in Eagle Lake High School.

One of our most recent loans is a collection of Police Chief Ben Johnson, who brought us a time clock that was worn by Eagle Lake night watchmen in the 1930's and 1940's as they would check places of business during the night hours. Each business checked had a wooden box in which was a key used in the checking process. We would very much like to have one of the boxes and keys to add to the clock and its case on display.

Mr. H. Carroll Morrison, father of Marsha Duncan, has loaned us several "treasures." Among these is a View Master also known as a stereoscope. Young people, be sure to visit the museum and see why it is so named. There are dozens of slides also to enjoy viewing through this interesting piece of entertainment. The Sears, Roebuck Catalogue of 1908 had six pages of advertisement concerning stereoscopes. I can recall seeing one or more of these in a home or homes when I was young. A standard model with a frame made from selected hardwood sold for 28 cents in 1908. I'll be happy for you to read more about this in my "treasured" catalogue which is a replica.

Our household iron collection continues to grow, both in number and interest. We already have a special stand ready for our display. Mr. Morrison has loaned us a set of three flat irons — large, medium, and small. The small iron is purportedly not smooth on the bottom, and some people think it was used for ironing collars and cuffs. He is also lending a charcoal-heated iron with its stand.
