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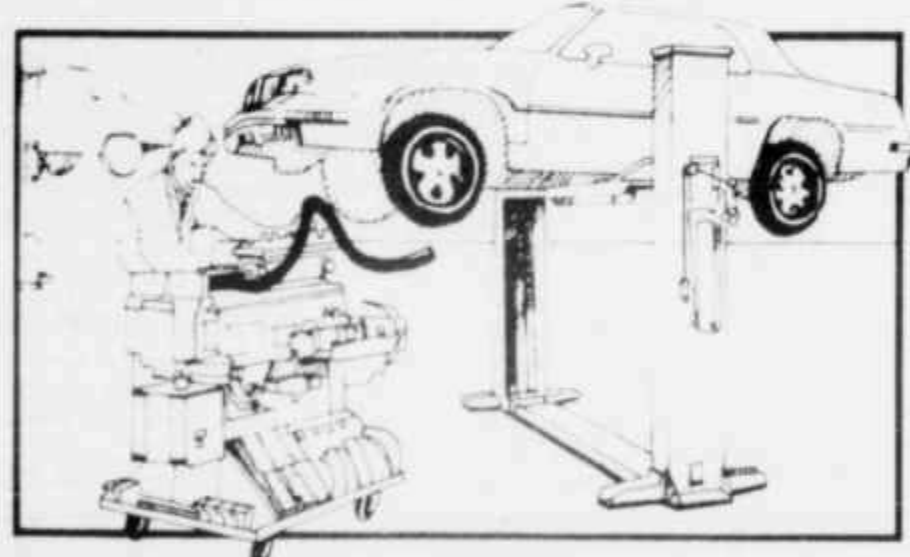

Despite budget-cutting, state spending rose 15%

State Capital Highlights

Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock released his latest budget update last week which reports state spending rose more than 15 percent last month, even as the state approaches bankruptcy.

Despite the ambitious budget-cutting proposals ordered by Gov. Mark White, new busy on the campaign trail, total state spending increased by more than \$200 million.

Bullock also said that 889 workers were added to state payrolls, despite a hiring freeze ordered last month by White.

The spending in March was a dramatic increase over the monthly average for the preceding six months. Bullock did not comment on why Mark White's austerity program did not appear to be working, and White's office disputed Bullock's figures.

A White spokesman said Bullock's staff erred by counting Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby as a White employee, a charge Bullock's staff laughed off as untrue.

Special Session Urged
State Rep. Bill Ceverha, R-Richardson, again lead a GOP push for White to call a special session to trim the budget.

Ceverha said White's austerity plan is doomed and digging the state deeper into debt. White responded no special session will be called. Hobby agreed with the governor.

Bullock, meanwhile, will monitor the progress of the austerity plan with monthly updates.

White Attacks Reagan
White was gone most of the week, spending the latter days in Washington calling for an oil import tariff.

He accused Reagan of leading the nation "down the road to devastation" by ignoring calls for the tariff. He also attacked White House Texas Vice President George Bush for bowing down to OPEC and called Treasury Secretary James Baker a liar.

Meanwhile, Reagan last week signed legislation releasing some \$420 million in offshore oil revenues to Texas.

Election Day Nears
Speculation continues that White could face a runoff opponent, probably Dallas attorney Don Crowder who continues to list new support from teachers and blacks, particularly.

White and Crowder are going hammer and tongs behind the scenes. White's staff denied arranging the

job-firing of former House Education Chairman Dan Kubiak shortly after he endorsed Crowder. Kubiak was fired as campaign manager of the Greg Loughlin 14th district congressional race.

In the Republican Primary, former Gov. Bill Clements still continues to lead polls, but whether he can outdistance a runoff with either Tom Leffler or Kent Hance is unclear.

Two Texas Supreme Court justices who have been subpoenaed to appear before the House Judicial Affairs Committee obtained a court order last week to block enforcement.

The committee wants Justices William Kilgartin and C.L. Ray to appear in connection with a probe into improper contact between judges and lawyers with pending cases.

Their attorney implied the panel chairman, San Antonio Representative Frank Tejeda, was trying to draw attention to his state senate campaign. Tejeda said he will continue to push the investigation.

Fundamentalist Rally
Over 4,000 people mobbed the Capitol Thursday to protest state regulation of private schools and home education.

The crowd spilled outside the LBJ Library where the State Board of Education was considering the rules. Protesters feared new rules would effectively wipe out several small unaccredited schools and hamstringing homeschooling.

Republican gubernatorial candidates Bill Clements and Kent Hance addressed the crowd.

Clements called the state proposals "a bureaucratic power grab" and Hance threatened to sue the board if the rules passed.

Texas-Israel Ties
Three state officials spoke to lobbyists for Israel last week and boosted areas of common interest.
