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Views On Dental Health

GOLD INLAYS

The most popular material for filling cavities is amalgam, often called a "silver" filling (actually a mixture of mercury, tin, copper, zinc and about 65-75% of silver powder). This material has proven successful for filling small and average sized cavities.

However, if the decay has ravaged a large section of the tooth, silver amalgam may not be up to the task. It does not always add strength to the tooth. In fact, it requires strong tooth structure to support it.

In the case of a large cavity, a filling of gold casting may be in order. The gold casting restoration drives its effectiveness from its great strength and resistance to breakage under chewing stress. Because of the properly gold is used mainly to support weakened tooth structure.

While waiting for the laboratory to make the gold casting from the impression taken by the dentist, the patient will have a temporary cement filling. A good gold inlay usually lasts many years and is considered stronger than a good amalgam filling.

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Children - our greatest natural resource

The greatest resource of any community is its children. Children do not grow to maturity without help and support. They are guided and influenced by the actions of those around them. What are we as adults teaching children through daily expectations? Do we have reasonable expectations for children?

To really understand children, you must be aware of the factors which affect a child's development. Probably everyone would agree that we would like for children to (1) develop independence, (2) become more responsible for their actions, and still (3) feel good about themselves. Adults who understand a child's needs and provide help as

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Children benefit from adult support in four ways:

1. A sense of security is necessary for a child's growth and development. A child feels secure when he knows he's loved and wanted. He feels secure when his physical needs are satisfied. A child feels secure when he is free to express his feelings and when his parents do likewise. A child feels secure when he knows he is always accepted by others, even if his behavior becomes unacceptable at times. With this feeling of security and love and belongingness, a freedom to learn and to explore the environment also develops.
2. A feeling of self-respect develops as the child learns he is a worthwhile person and a unique individual. Self-respect is fostered by mutual respect. Until a child is loved and feels secure, he cannot develop self-respect. Family members teach self-respect through (a) daily interactions, (b) by accepting the child as he is, not as they wish he would be, and (c) by showing respect for his ideas and feelings. Adults also promote self-respect by providing opportunities for the young child to become more independent and more responsible for his own actions as he is ready developmentally.
3. New abilities and accomplishments are achieved in a supportive environment where the child receives help and encouragement as needed. The child is the adult's clue as to how much support to give. A key to meeting this basic need is consistency in actions and words.
4. A child's system of value is promoted when parents and other family members show genuine approval for his actions. A person's value system reflects what he considers to be important. Values affect our actions and attitudes. Reactions can reinforce the child's behavior and help him learn to appreciate his own accomplishments. Giving honest approval helps to promote a value system.

Remember, each child is a distinct individual with his own unique interests and abilities. Though he may be a member of your family, the young child is not just like his parents or brothers and sisters. He is himself, distinctly different individual. There is no one else exactly like him in the world. That makes him special indeed.

The Colorado County Fair Association directors have authorized the addition of a special Junior Show County Fair.

The special sale will be held at Columbus on Saturday, September 13, 1986.

The sale superintendent is Willie "Prof" Fitzgerald of Columbus. Assistant superintendent is Ernie Gena of Nalla. Sales chairman are Max Dittmar of Bernardo, beef heifers; James Glueck of Columbus, beef and broiler; Irvin J. Janik of Columbus, fryer rabbits; Harrison Walker of Eagle Lake, publicity; and Julius Bantek of Weimar, hospitality.

The guidelines for the Junior Show sales are as follows:

1. Sale will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, September 13.
2. Members of Colorado County 4-H and FFA Clubs are eligible to sell through the sale.
3. Lots to be sold include special designation of grade, F1, and registered heifers, blue ribbon or higher placing pens of three (3) broilers, blue ribbon or higher placing pens of three (3) fryer rabbits.
4. Only heifers designated for sale on June 14, 1986 and approved for sale by sitting committee on September 12 will be eligible for sale.
5. Heifers must be certified by veterinarian within 30 days of sale to be open (not bred).
6. Heifers at sale time must be ages 12 months to 24 months.
7. Exhibitors will be charged a three percent (3%) sales commission.
