Mary Elizabeth Youens Hopkins is the daughter of Dr. Willis G. and Gay Burford Youens of Columbus. She was born in Columbus and reared at the Youens family home on Milan Street which Mrs. Hopkins and her husband, James G. Hopkins, have restored. Mrs. Hopkins attended Columbus schools and graduated from Columbus High School in 1930. She attended The University of Texas at Austin from 1930 to 1932.

Mrs. Hopkins married James G. Hopkins of Garwood in 1946 when he returned from four years service in the army. Mrs. Hopkins has four children, Kenneth Brune, Mary Anne Brune Pickens, Jane Hopkins Potter and James G. Hopkins Jr.

Mrs. Hopkins' work experience is reflective of her many and varied interests in the Colorado County community at large. Mrs. Hopkins served as assistant to the Colorado County superintendent of schools, J.H. Woon, from 1938 until the beginning of World War II when she was appointed office manager of the Colorado County War Price and Ration Board. She served in this capacity until 1944. In 1944 Mrs. Hopkins opened Columbus Drug Store. She operated this business until 1946 when she married Mr. Hopkins and sold the business. The family moved to Garwood in 1947. In 1948 Mrs. Hopkins began taking an active part in the operation of the Garwood Rice Sales Company which

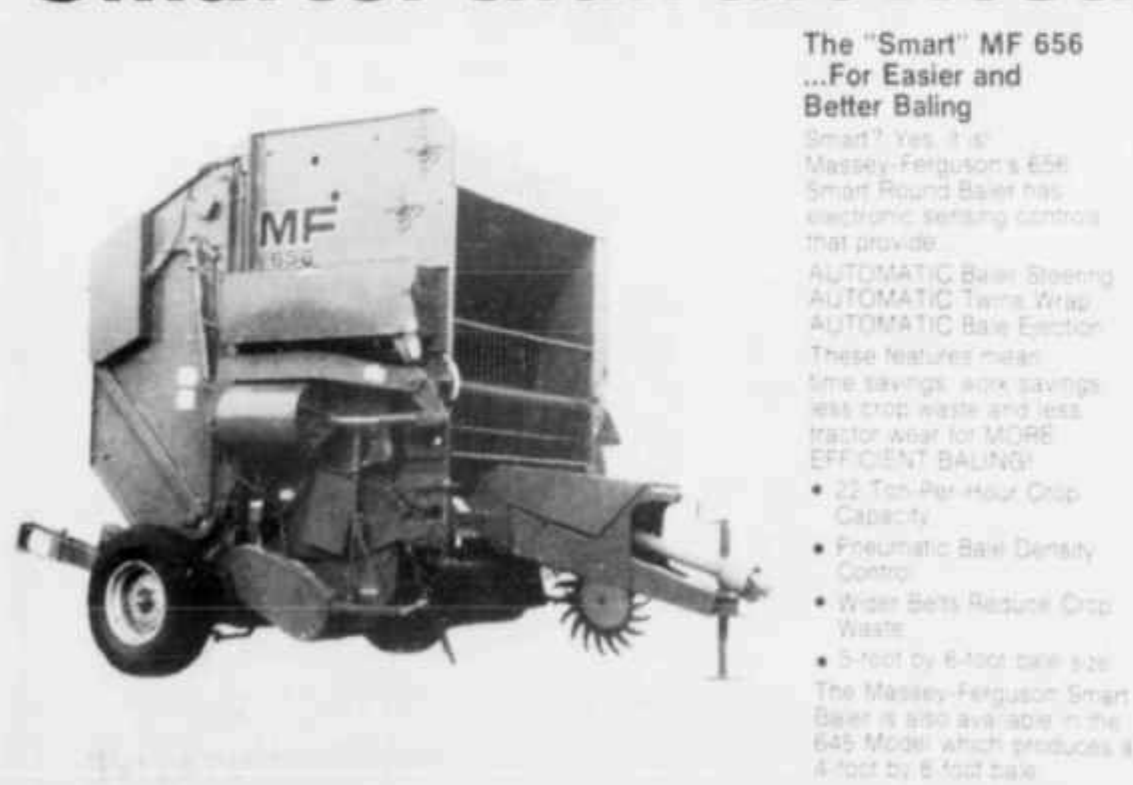
