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- 1 A large one-time reduction.
The biggest thing that has happened to your electric bill in a long time is the fuel refund that lowered your bill last month. That was a one-time credit, which reduced the amount you paid by almost two-thirds. Now your bill will be getting back to normal. Or almost. Almost, because while the fuel refund had a large effect for one month, that is not the only thing that's been happening to your bill.

Last year the fuel factor on your bill was reduced two different times. Result: lower bills. Earlier this year, CPL began applying new rates. The new rates are based on a \$25 million base rate increase and a \$68 million dollar fuel factor reduction. Result: lower bills.
- 3 Summer's coming.
Another major factor will influence electric bills in the near future. Old Sol. Summer causes many people to increase their use of electricity, and summer electric rates are slightly higher than winter rates. So think about how you are using electricity this summer. Watch your air conditioner's thermostat settings, keep doors and windows closed, and make sure your major appliances are operating efficiently.
- 4 Good year for electric bills.
Overall, the past twelve months or so have been good ones for electric bills. The average price of a kilowatt hour for CPL's residential customers has come down from 7.35¢ in January, 1985 to 6.40¢ last April. That's a reduction of about 13%. We're always working to keep your electric service dependable and economical. And it sure brightens our day to give you some good news.

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Views On Dental Health

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ANTI-BRACE FOOD

Kids have a way of destroying the most destructible. Johnnie had a beautiful set of braces. Should have stayed in place until the day of reckoning. But Johnnie was a kid. It was a hot day and he was trying to break an ice cube with his teeth. Pop went the ice cube — pop went the braces! Of course, with the evidence gone (melted) and the braces in Johnnie's hand, it's easy to lay blame on the orthodontist for placing the braces on improperly. True, orthodontists are only human and this can happen — but most of the time, braces that come loose in treatment are not due to this factor, but rather to the type of food the patient eats (or tried to pulverize). Hard foods, like candies, French bread crusts, hard vegetables, ice cubes, etc. can all fracture the cement that holds the brace to the tooth thereby causing a loose brace. Sticky foods, like chewy candies can do the same thing. Special attention has to be paid to the kind of food eaten in order to preserve the braces and the teeth that the braces are hooked onto.
