

Pecan disease, insect field day Friday

A pecan disease and insect field day will be held at 10 a.m. this Friday morning, May 2. The field day will be held at the recently established Hajdik orchard, one mile south of Mullins Prairie on Farm-to-Market 155.

The program will include: insect and disease control, grass control, cut and fire ant control and general pest management information. Dr. Charles Cole, extension entomologist with Texas A&M University will lead the discussion.

The field day will be held regardless of weather. In the event of bad weather, the program will be held at the Holman Community Center.

The Fayette and Colorado County pecan committees invited all interested persons to attend.

Termite season

Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites because winged forms appear and swarm.

Winged termites outdoors are a natural occurrence, so usually there is no problem. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home.

Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it is important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures.

Termites have a broad waist — ants have a narrow, constricted waist. — winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads) — ants have elbowed antennae.

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, or old lumber and other sources of termite food. These should be removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that wood meets dirt (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-wood structures to reach a food source or water source. These tunnels (about 1/4 inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a slab, they will virtually non-stop throughout the weekend until closing time at 7:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 4.

A queen contest Friday afternoon is a new addition to the festival this year.

There will be plenty of activities for the youngsters, including kiddie rides, clown, a juggler, a magician, special concessions for the younger set and featuring a series of Czech fairy tales acted out by a group of student thespians. A new and exciting event added this year will be the Little Brunches Rodeo to be held each evening.

Czech Fest is open from 5 p.m. on Friday until midnight; from 10 Saturday morning until midnight and from 10 Sunday morning until 7:30 p.m. Admission is \$3 for adults, children 6-12 years \$1 and children under six free. There is no charge for parking. Additional information can be

USDA's reserve program ends May 16

Daniel C. Streckfuss, county executive director of the Colorado County ASC, announces the sign-up period for USDA's second Conservation Reserve Program begins May 5 and ends May 16. Farmers who want to bid to enter their highly erodible cropland into USDA's conservation reserve program may do so during the program's second sign-up period, May 5-16.

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng said producers will be offered the option to bid for a conservation reserve program contract beginning with either the 1986 to 1987 crop year.

For contracts which are effective immediately, annual payments will be made beginning October 1, 1986. Producers can not harvest any 1986 crop planted on land to be placed in the program. Any producer who has had or will have a crop mechanically removed from the designated area is ineligible for a 1986 contract.

For contracts which become effective on October 1, 1986, or later, producers will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop, and no annual payments will be made before October 1, 1987.

USDA will establish maximum acceptable rental rates after the end of the sign-up and bid data have been evaluated. Additional sign-up dates for the 1987 crop year will be announced later. Additional sign-up dates for the 1987 crop year will be

announced later.

For the 1986 sign-up, designated cropland may be grazed until the Commodity Credit Corporation enters into a conservation reserve program contract with the producer and notifies him that livestock must be removed to comply with contract provisions. Land that is designated for 1987 contracts may not be grazed after October 1, 1986.

During the first sign-up period, which ran March 3-15, Streckfuss said 838,356 acres of highly erodible cropland were entered into the conservation reserve program. Accepted bids ranged from \$5 to \$90 per acre, and the average bid was \$41.82 per acre.
