Selection committee chairman Dr. David Rod noted that this year's \$75,500 in awards is the highest total in the four years of the PACE program.

Award recipients must rank in the top five percent of their class or score exceptionally high on college entrance examinations, as well as complete TLC's admissions requirements. In order to participate in the PACE program for four years, the recipient must maintain a 3.0 grade point average.

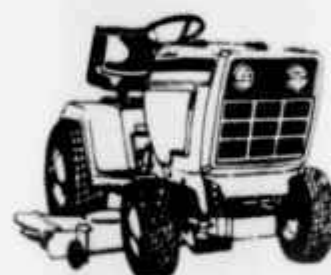
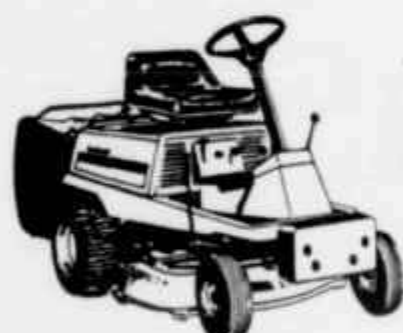

Tractor safety

The sharp increase in agricultural activities in the spring means more tractor accidents. Overturns still cause the most tractor-related deaths, says a safety engineer with the Texas A&M University System.

These can be avoided by extra driving care, particularly in unfamiliar terrain. Other tractor safety tips include being alert at all times, making sure all equipment is in good working order, not allowing riders, matching ground speed to operating conditions, turning off the engine when refueling, and securely blocking the tractor when removing wheels.
