Stalk-boring caterpillars in rice reported higher than usual this year

Higher than the usual number of reports of stalk-boring caterpillars in rice have been received this year. Perhaps producers, consultants and chemical company representatives are on-the-lookout for the dreaded Mexican rice borer, *Eurema loftini* (Dyar), which has been steadily moving northward since last year. This species has not been detected north of Kleberg County this year, but we have had unusually high populations of the sugarcane borer, *Diatraea saccharalis* (Fabricius) in corn and sorghum throughout the upper coastal bend counties. This species also attacks native grasses and rice. A third species, the rice stalk borer *Chilo phajadellus* (Zincken), also attacks rice stalks and is occasionally found in sorghum. All of these species can produce similar damage to rice as caterpillars tunnel in the stalks.

Larvae of the stalk borer caterpillars on rice are superficially similar, but differ in their markings, particularly as they become full grown. All three species have dark brown head capsules and dark plates on the top side of the first body segment behind the heads. Their predominantly cream-colored bodies can reach up to 3/4 inch in length. Sugarcane borer larva bodies have a series of dark brown dots on each body segment. The Mexican rice borer has a series of dashes which resemble equal (+) signs down their backs. The rice stalk borer is cream-colored with a purple half-moon shaped line on the side of each segment.

Rice fields should be checked for the presence of borers. Usually, the number of infested stalks is low—below one percent. However, some fields have been surveyed with as many as 20 percent of the stalks infested with sugarcane and rice stalk borer larvae. Infestations are apparently more severe on levees.

To check for larvae, look for broken stalks, caterpillar excrement (frass) on the flag leaf or whorl, or dead upper (flag) leaves, particularly in pre-boot stage rice. External damage of infestation includes a blackened hole where the caterpillar has entered. Dissect plants suspected of being infested and identify, if possible, the species involved. Suspect Mexican rice borer larvae should be reported to your county Extension agent—agriculture.

The problem with this borer

infestation is that there are no registered products for use to control these species in rice. Undoubtedly, some of the other products registered for other pests on rice such as those containing carbaryl, carbaryl and methyl parathion would probably kill some caterpillars hit by applications of these products. However, the challenge is to get the pesticide to the larvae residing inside the stalks. None of our registered products have systemic activity. So, once the worms tunnel into the plants, they are safe until the damage they are going to do has been done. Theoretically, insecticide applica-

tions would be most effective in preventing infestations of stalk boring species if they had been timed to the hatching of the eggs from which these infestations arise.

The other unknown factor in dealing with these species in rice production is the absence of an economic threshold level. Since these are considered minor or incidental pests, research has not been conducted to determine the relationship between the percent infested stalks and yield loss. Thus, the cost of insecticides to try to prevent this problem may not be recuperated by the value of the yield loss prevented.

Several political leaders have gone on TV in the past week requesting the special session of the state legislature to consider a state lottery and pari-mutuel gambling as the answer to our budget needs. They are treating these as economic issues. Even that logic is faulty, as Atlantic City has found out, but that misses the point. The issue is a moral one, which Christians should address.

Free gift orders

Some "free gift" offers come with strings attached, that the consumer doesn't find out about until the merchandise has been received, says economics specialist Nancy Granovsky. She points out that under Federal Trade Commission rules, all conditions and terms for receiving a free item must be sent out with the original offer. "Before you sign up for this type of offer, be sure to read the fine print, she advises. "You'll probably find out that you have to pay something or do something in order to get the free item."

Warranty adds value to used cars at Lake Motors, Inc.

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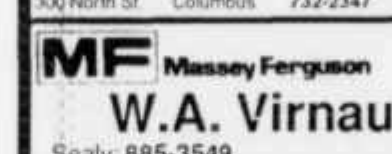
