Rice sales here first of season in area

Henry Sunderman again claims Lot No. One with July 10 cutting

The first rice sales of the new harvest season were held Tuesday and Wednesday at the rice office in Eagle Lake. A buyer said it was the first sale held in a wide area, including Bay City.

A check with the area rice dryers Monday showed that many farmers are cutting, but that by the end of the week, most farmers would be in the field.

Farmers were taking advantage of the near rainless afternoons, but the unusual low humidity may have caught some by surprise. A field sample checked in the morning at 21 or 22 percent could have been down to 19 percent by mid-afternoon. They also were leary of the high

temperatures, since a sudden shower cracks the rice in the hull like water dropping on heated glass. "You can hear it popping," one farmer said.

Doyle Waldrop, the grader at the rice office here, mirrored speculation that farmers were concerned with the smut showing up in the crop. While it seems to be low enough not to cause any problems, if it gets worse it could keep crops out of government loan. That would mean a farmer selling at the world price level may not only about half or less of what he would under government loan.

Of the seven groups offered for sale Tuesday, only one was graded without

any smut comment. Three showed two-tenths percent smut, two showed only a trace and one was graded at 75.

Buyers from the rice mills were at the office here Tuesday afternoon. Bids offered, if any, will be posted Wednesday.

Two of the lots offered were graded 65/71 and one was graded at 62/70, with the others in between. The first number is the grader's estimate of how many pounds of whole kernels a miller would get after milling 100 pounds of rough rice. The second number reflects the number of pounds of whole and broken kernels estimated after milling.

City accepts Stiles' offer to build new N-S runway

An offer by precinct four commissioner Bill Stiles to build a new east-west runway near the municipal airport was unanimously accepted Tuesday night at the regular council meeting.

The acceptance was given after council spent considerable time discussing airport improvement recommendations made to council by the airport advisory board. Among the numerous recommendations, the council approved a motion by Joe Duncan that up to \$5,000 of city airport funds be spent on a new airport beacon to be installed in a new location at the airport. That will allow the old beacon to be removed to make room for a hangar construction project proposed by Dan Canaris.

The new runway proposed by Stiles would be an east-west strip perhaps as long as 4,200 feet. Although the commissioner was not at the meeting, airport advisory board member Bill Appelt said the board met with him July 15 and heard the offer for the first time. It would be built totally at county expense, and on county right-of-way through the subdivision that was planned around the turn of the century and that now is the location of the airport, Appelt said. Stiles probably could construct the strip before he leaves office at the end of the year. It probably would be a grass strip.

As for other recommendations, council took no action. They discussed fencing to provide security for hangared planes. That could cost as much as \$15,000 to \$20,000 for 4,200 feet of 6-foot chain link fence. They also discussed the advisory board recommendation paving and widening the main east-west runway at a cost of about \$70,000 to \$90,000; repaving the old north-south runway at a taxiway at a cost of about \$20,000 to \$30,000.

Neither drainage changes nor airport use fees were discussed per se. The advisory board indicated it will discuss user fees at some future time, and if a new north-south runway is built that could improve drainage. Also, City Manager Robert Klockman said city crews are clearing brush slowly, and that would improve drainage also.

In other business, Council:

- Listened to a letter from Paulene Klockman, founder of Revitalize Eagle Lake, and its president for three years. She questioned why council called a public hearing last week to receive public comment on a planning grant application, then ignored the public when only one person spoke against the application.
- Heard from resident Mike Argo comment on Mrs. Klockman's letter. "I see this

Chamber hears about bus, TEXCEL program

There is no hope of restoring commercial bus service to Eagle Lake, was the report Eagle Lake Chamber of Commerce president Becky Anderson gave to the group's board of directors when they met Monday at Anna Lee's Kitchen.

Anderson attended a Texas Railroad Commission hearing in Austin which addressed the void in service created when Texas Bus Lines stopped service here and at other points along its Houston-San Antonio route. A bus lines spokesman said that although he could not get enough passenger revenue from which to help Greyhound, he would not let his buses in the San Antonio terminal, he would not

resume service if terminal access was given.

Greyhound, also represented at the meeting, said they would not resume serving the route either.

rs. Anderson said the area would have to rely on other shipping for package express, such as United Parcel Service, and also rely on the new in-country bus service in Columbus to connect to the commercial service offered there. The local bus service number is 732-MOVE.
