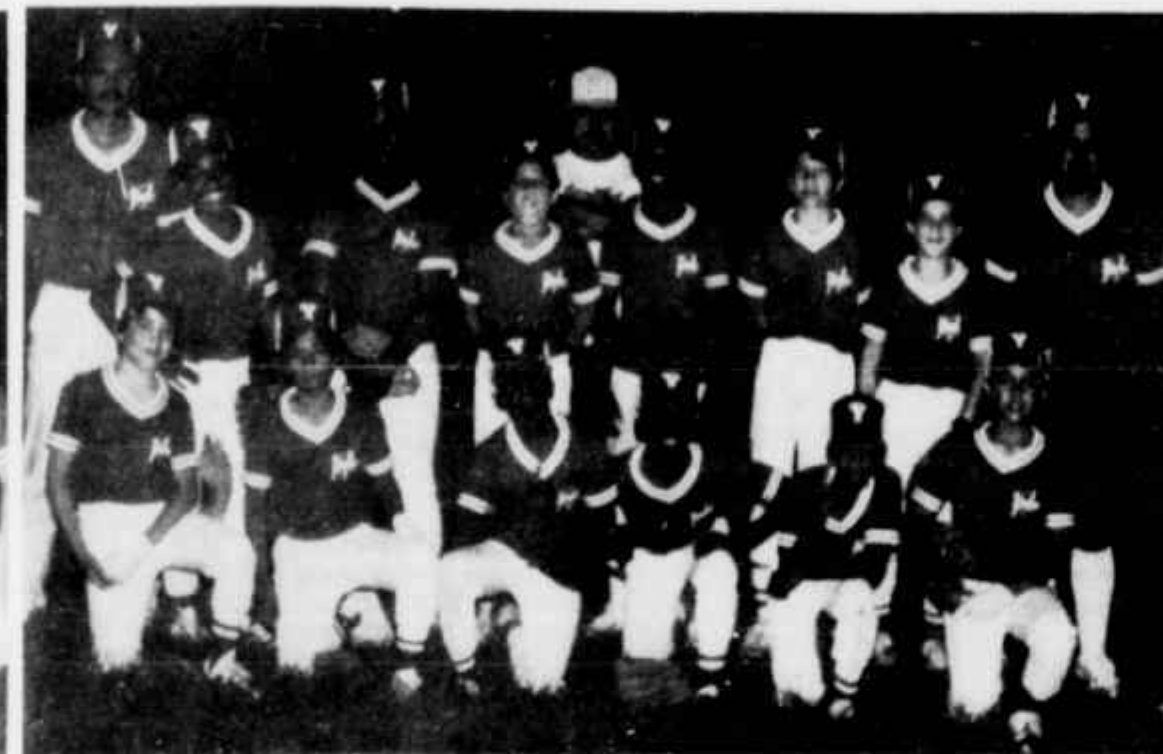

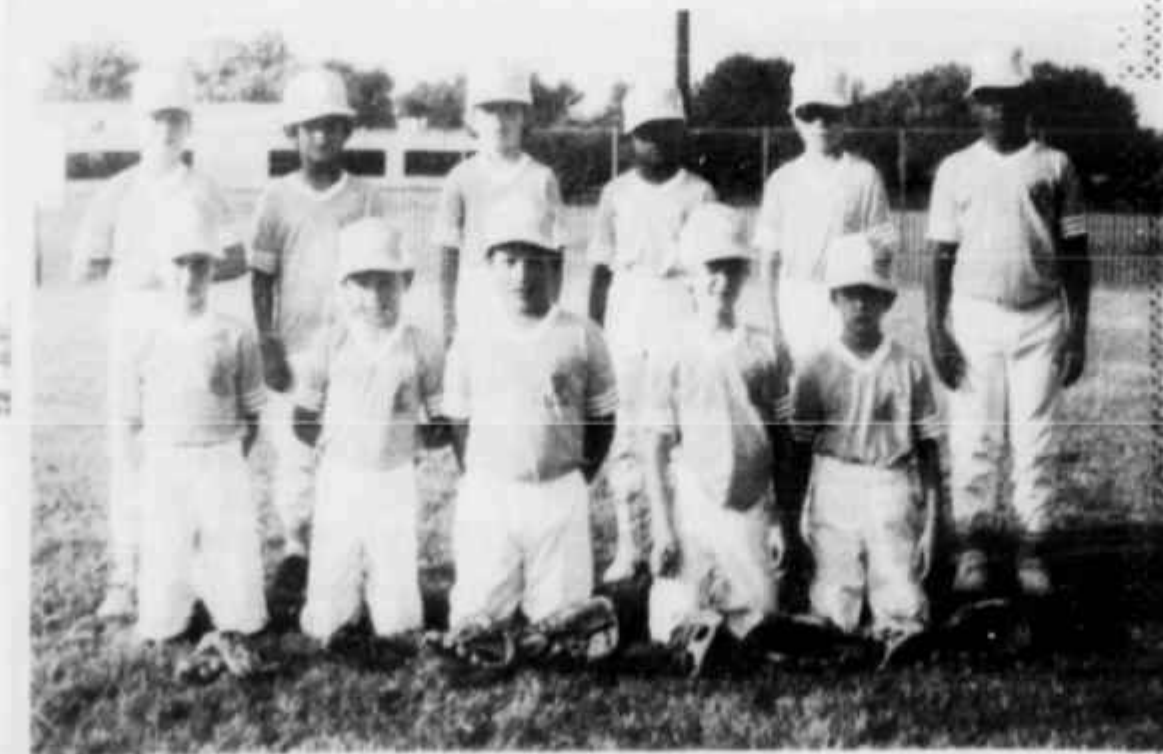

Texas lifetime licenses offered for 1986-87

Texas hunters and fishermen now have an opportunity to invest in the state's outdoor resources by purchasing lifetime hunting and fishing licenses. The lifetime license program is one of several licensing changes slated to go into effect on September 1.

Lifetime licenses eliminate the need for sportsmen to obtain a new hunting or fishing license each year. Purchasers will receive a permanent card and license, and a new license will be sent automatically by mail each year prior to the August 31 license expiration date.

Application forms for lifetime licenses will be available by July 15 from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department headquarters, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744, and from all TPWD law enforcement offices across the state. They also may be obtained by calling toll-free 1-800-792-1112.

A lifetime resident combination hunting/fishing license costs \$500, and a lifetime resident hunting or fishing license is priced at \$300. These licenses may be purchased by Texas residents only, but are still good in Texas if the resident moves to another state.

Funds received from sales of lifetime licenses and specified contributions will be placed in the Lifetime License Endowment Fund. Only the interest from the fund will be used by the TPWD to acquire, develop, manage and repair hunting and fishing areas.

Also effective September 1, every person hunting or fishing in Texas will be required to have a license.

Persons currently exempted from fishing license requirements because of age - under 17 years of age or 65 and older - will be required to obtain a "no fee" or free fishing license. They will remain exempt from having to purchase special fishing stamps such as the state saltwater fishing stamp and the state

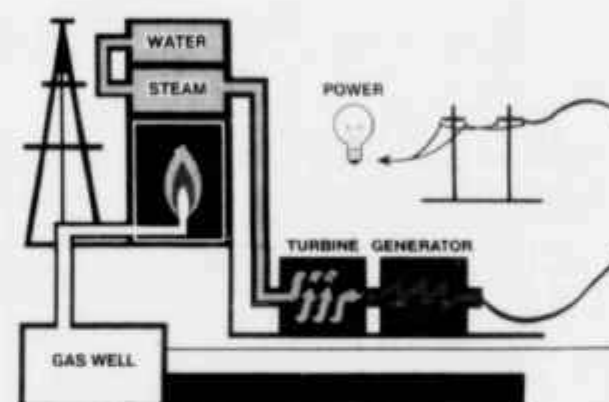
freshwater trout fishing stamp.

The free license will be available either from any TPWD office or game warden, by writing to TPWD headquarters in Austin or by calling toll-free 1-800-792-1112.

Also beginning September 1, all hunters will be required to have a hunting license (or exempt license), regardless of county of residence or land ownership. Prior to September 1, persons hunting species other than deer or turkey on land on which they

reside were exempted from hunting license requirements. However, after August 31, those persons will be required to have a hunting license, including those under 17 or 65 and older who will be required to have a \$6 exempt hunting license to hunt any wild bird or animal.

Requirements for special hunting stamps currently in effect will continue after August 31. These are the archery stamp, state waterfowl stamp and white-winged dove stamp.
