Rice field day and tour July 2

Dr. Charles Bollich, USDA rice breeder with The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will be one of the guest speakers at the 12th annual field day and tour on July 2 at 5:30 p.m. at Texas A&M's Eagle Lake Research Site. Of special interest will be producer and scientist discussions concerning new techniques for both cotton cropping and water management. Potential new varieties, fertilizer practices, insect and weed management, weed control, disease management, and cropping systems research also will be shown and discussed.

Field tours will begin at 5:30 p.m., followed by a catered meal and program. Dr. Mickey Paggi, Extension economist from Texas A&M University, will discuss the "world market price," and a "rice market development program" will be presented by the Rice Council. Area producers, Jacko Garrett and Dick Kubacka will discuss cotton cropping and water management.

The Texas Rice Research Foundation, Texas Rice Improvement Association and the Colorado County Extension Rice and Soybean Committee in cooperation with Texas A&M scientists help plan and sponsor this annual event. The rice industry is rapidly changing, making it important to keep abreast of technology as it develops to improve economic rice production. Make the most of summer with melons

Melons are always looking for ways to cool down on our hot summer days. Moist, juicy melons are a perfect way to beat our summer heat. Watermelons, cantaloupes, and honeydews are favorites in every part of Texas. Melons are great for picnics, outings to the beach, or just on the dinner table.

Texas watermelons are grown in various parts of the state, and are available all summer long, right up until September. The two principal varieties produced in Texas are the Jubilee, which is light green with dark green stripes, and the Charleston Gray, which has a grayish rind.

Maturity and size are essential factors when selecting a quality watermelon. Color is the best key to ripeness in watermelons. The underside should be turning from white or pale green to a light yellow. "Thumping" a watermelon is not a good indicator of ripeness.

A whole melon should be symmetrical, with a dull bloom, rather than a shiny surface. A 4x8 inch wedge of fresh watermelon contains only 110 calories, and a good amount of Vitamin A.

Must retailers will charge a little more for cut watermelons, but this is a sure way of telling the maturity of the melon. If you are in doubt of selecting a good one, white streaks and whitish seeds in a cut melon should be avoided. Sweetness depends on variety, not appearance.

Texas ranks second in the production of cantaloupes. Cantaloupes, or muskmelons, were named after the city of Cantaloupe, Italy, where it is believed these species of melon was first grown. When picking a ripe Texas cantaloupe, look for good, deep netting on the outside that tends to be golden in color. The netting, or veining, should be thick, coarse, and corky. It should also give slightly to light thumb pressure on the blossom end.

Cups watermelon balls; discard seeds. Refrigerate watermelon balls and pulp, along with the rest of the fruit, until well chilled. To serve, place reserved pulp in bottom of watermelon shell. Top with fruit. Garnish with pecans and mint. Top with small scoops of favorite sherbert. Serves 10.

Melon Melange
1 C. sugar
1/2 C. water
1/3 C. orange liqueur
Watermelon
Cantaloupe
Honeydew melon
Combine the sugar and water and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and add liqueur. Prepare melon balls or dice the melons. Chill until ready to serve. Just before serving, place melon balls in a large serving bowl and pour liqueur flavored syrup over fruit. Yield: 8 to 10 servings.

Turkey Salad in a Cantaloupe Bowl
1/4 C. mayonnaise
1/4 C. cream cheese
1/3 C. celery, diced
1 T. pimento
2 C. cooked turkey breast chunks
1 cantaloupe, halved, seeded and notched
Strawberries, mint and leaf lettuce (optional)
In a mixing bowl, blend together cream cheese and mayonnaise. Add celery and pimento. Pour mixture over turkey and onion. Stuff in cavities of cantaloupe halves that have been seeded and notched on edges. Serve on a plate of leaf lettuce and garnish with strawberries and parsley, if desired. Makes 2 servings.

Cool Fruit-Sherbert Boat
1 long watermelon (about 2 lbs.)
1 pt. hulled strawberries
2 C. sliced fresh peaches
1 pt. blueberries
2 C. honeydew melon balls
2 C. cantaloupe balls
2 C. cut-up bananas
1/2 C. peach halves
Fresh mint sprigs
Sherbert
Cut a lengthwise slice, 2 1/2 inches thick, from top of watermelon. Remove pulp from inside; set aside. With a sharp knife, cut around inside of watermelon, leaving a shell about 3/4 inch thick. Remove center pulp. Use to make 4
