Texas Dept. of Health Region 11 to begin collecting service fees

The Texas Department of Health announced that beginning July 1, 1986, the clinic, as well as all public clinics in the Texas Department of Health Region 11, will collect fees from patients to help pay part or all of their costs of service. Payments will be based on ability to pay.

Funding for the Texas Department of Health has been reduced; yet the number of patients has increased as have health care costs. To offset these factors patients who can afford to contribute to the cost of their services will now be asked to do so.

Dr. Staley, director of PHR 11, said, "The charging of fees is a means of ensuring continued service to all who need health care. No one will be denied service at the clinics because of no money. Anyone who can afford private health care are asked to see their family physician."

A sliding scale, similar to that currently used in determining eligibility for the Department of Human Resources' Food Stamp and AFDC programs, will be used to determine the amount the patient is expected to pay. Anyone that passes the guidelines, will be referred to their family physician. Every cent of the patients' contributions will go toward defraying the growing costs that have threatened the ability to continue serving all persons who need the clinic's help.

Views On Dental Health

ASPIRIN-GOOD AND BAD

If you child has a toothache get him or her to a dentist immediately. If this is not practical, a proper dosage of aspirin will help make him feel more comfortable until you can get to the dentist. However, you should take precautions when administering aspirin. Make sure your child takes the aspirin with enough water to prevent upsetting his stomach. Aspirin is a systemic drug; it relieves pain only after it has entered the bloodstream. So make sure it gets all the way down with plenty of water. Never place the tablet on the painful tooth or on the gum or let it dissolve in his mouth and ask him to swallow it around the acting tooth.

The aspirin can irritate the tissue seriously. Never crush aspirin and place it between the cheek and the gum. Aspirin and related compounds are a common source of burns of the oral cavity. While lesions can develop where the medication touches the cheek or gum. The tissues will become painful and the white ulcerated areas may be removed leaving a painful, raw bleeding area.
