Dilue Rose Harris chapter DRT receives Texas History award

At the state convention of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas held in Dallas during May of this year, the Dilue Rose Harris chapter was given the Texas History Award for 1986.

The award was based upon the 1985 publication of the book "Come Reminiscence With Me, A History of Gladden, Texas — 1885-1985" by Dorothy Jean Heine, charter member and organizing president of the Dilue Rose Harris chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

The Texas History Award is given annually for achievements in publication and manuscript on Texas History before 1900. "Come Reminiscence With Me..." is an overview of the history of Gladden, Texas from the time of its founding in 1885 to its centennial year, 1985, briefly covering the life styles, events of significance in civic and economic areas, and the growth patterns of the town, businesses, schools and churches. It is 155 pages in length and has 216 pictures of the town, events and people.

Mrs. Heine, a native daughter of Gladden and fifth generation Texan, is a direct descendant of Abram and Nancy Millar Alley, Austin 300 Colonists. Abram Alley and his brothers Rawson Alley, John Alley and Thomas Alley came to Texas with Stephen F. Austin in 1822. They settled on the banks of the Colorado River at the Atascosa crossing in Colorado County, Texas. Abram Alley served as an officer in the Texas Army under General Sam Houston; was involved in the Runaway Scrape and the Battle of San Jacinto. The other three brothers were already dead when the war for Texas Independence was won. John and Thomas were killed in Indian campaigns in the 1820's, and Rawson died of wounds received in the Battle of San Antonio in 1835. Members of the Alley family descendants are still in possession of portions of the original Alley land grants.

3 C. cooked poultry, pork, beef or ham
3 C. cooked rice

Soupier Tuna Bake
1 can (13 ounces) tuna*
1 package (10 ounces) frozen mixed vegetables, cooked
3 C. cooked rice
1 1/2 T. onion soup mix
1 1/4 C. boiling water
1 can (11 ounces) condensed cheese soup
Dash of pepper
1/2 C. dry bread crumbs
Combine tuna, vegetables and rice. Stir soup mix into water; heat 5 minutes. Blend in cheese soup and pepper. Stir into rice-vegetable mixture. Turn into a buttered casserole. Top with bread crumbs. Bake at 400 degrees F. for 20 minutes. Makes 8 servings. *Or 1 can (16 ounces) salmon may be substituted.

Dr. Henry F. "Buddy" Novosad Jr., of Wharton, died June 14 in a Wharton hospital after a brief illness. He was born on August 29, 1922, in Bryan, a son of Henry and Mary Urbanec Novosad. He married Mary Jane Scott on June 12, 1947 in East Bernard. They were married 39 years.

He graduated from the East Bernard High School in 1939, attended Schriener Military Institute for two years, graduated from Baylor University in Waco with a B.A. in 1944 and graduated from Baylor University School of Dentistry in 1947. He joined Outlaw & Blair Clinic in June, 1947, and continued his practice with that group for 39 years. He was a member of the American Dental Association, the Texas Dental Association, the Houston District Dental Society, the Texas Academy of General Dentistry, and a Fellow in the American Academy of General Dentistry.

He was member of the Wharton Christian Fellowship, he had served as president of the Wharton Lions Club, president of Wharton County Shrine Club, and had served on the board of directors of the Wharton Chamber of Commerce.

Survivors include his widow, Mary Jane; two sons and daughters-in-law, Dr. Garland Scott and Rhonda Novosad of Wharton and Dr. Byron Lee and Debra Jean Novosad of Houston; a daughter and son-in-law, Lisa and Dan Sharp of Houston; two granddaughters, Lauren Brooke of Wharton and Jeanine Alice of Houston; three brothers, Thomas L. Novosad of Houston, Clem H. Novosad of Dallas, and Stephen J. Novosad of Fairfax, Virginia.

Services were conducted at 4 p.m. on June 17 from the First United Methodist Church of Wharton with Rev. Bill Shifflet, of the Wharton Christian Fellowship, officiating. Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Wharton Funeral Home.

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Wallis Church to celebrate 128th anniversary

Then in 1982 the church moved to its new facility on Highway 36 west of Wallis, taking on the name Wallis Bible Church in 1984. The church has seen great changes in the past few years. Rapid growth was seen in the 1970's at which time many young men were licensed by the church and sent out into the ministry.
