Darrell Estlinbaum, a handicapped child from Eagle Lake, enjoyed a special two weeks at the Texas Lions Camp sponsored by the Eagle Lake Noon Lions Club. Darrell, 12, had the opportunity to swim, horseback ride, fish, study nature, play sports and go on an overnight campout.

All facilities and activities at the Texas Lions Camp are wheelchair accessible and the programs are adapted to serve children who are physically handicapped, visually or hearing impaired.

This is the only place our child really feels 'normal.' He gets encouragement at Lions Camp that he couldn't get anywhere else and has very good role models. We think the Lions Camp works miracles," said a camper's parent.

All activities are well supervised by a trained staff of counselors with a high ratio of one counselor for every three campers.

The Texas Lions Camp is located on 500 acres of the Texas Hill country near Kerrville. The camp holds four 2-week sessions for physically handicapped children ages seven to 16.

Rating fabric for quality

It doesn't matter whether you're buying a new dress, an upholstered sofa, some linens or material to sew at home — the quality of the fabric will determine the quality of the finished product.

To be sure you get the best quality for your money, read the product labels for fiber content and care instructions. Then do these simple tests on the fabric to determine its quality.

To test for wrinkle resistance, crush the fabric in your hand for several seconds. Release it and look for wrinkles.

Colorfastness can be tested by

wrapping a small square of white fabric over the end of a pencil eraser and then rubbing it on the fabric in question. Then check to see if any color has rubbed off on the white fabric.

Check on stretch recovery by measuring a small section of fabric. Stretch it firmly and release. Then remeasure the section and compare it to the original dimensions.

Look at both sides of the fabric for an even distribution of color. Check the side seams for color differences.

Also look for fabric flaws. Open up the garment or fabric and hold it to the light so you can see any imperfections. To determine if fabric crispness is due to sizing, rub the

fabric together briskly. Look for flaking which indicates the presence of sizing. Once the sizing has washed out, the fabric may be more limp or have less shape than needed to look good.

"Pilling" is the formation of balls of fiber on the surface of a fabric. Rub fabric against itself or rub lightly with a nail file or emery board, then look for breakage or rough surfaces.

Insert your thumbs into the fabric and apply pressure in opposite directions. Look at how closely yarns are woven or knitted together. The number of threads per inch can indicate the strength of the fabric.

After testing the fabric, ask yourself if it's suitable for the intended use. Combine your information about fabric quality with other production information such as care instructions and price to get the best buy for your money.

Agency offers free certificates to honor outstanding grandparents

Mothers and fathers have long been honored with special holidays. The Texas Department of Aging is offering free certificates honoring outstanding grandparents on National Grandparents' Day, September 7.

These certificates, signed by Texas Governor Mark White and Department of Aging executive director Bob Bobbitt, will be special two-color editions commemorating both National Grandparents' Day on September 7 and the Texas sesquicentennial.

They are printed on parchment paper and are suitable for framing.

Department on Aging spokesman Allen Baca said the TDOA promotion is gradually improving the public's awareness of National Grandparents' Day. "It's a pretty new holiday," observed Baca. "It was signed into effect in 1978 by President Carter. This is the second straight year we've offered the free certificates and we're giving them away by the tens of thousands. People seem to respond well to the idea."

Those who are ordering certificates are asked to give their own addresses, not those of the recipient or recipients. Due to the large number of requests, the Department on Aging cannot engrave the names of grandparents on the certificates. An open space is provided where the presenter or a calligrapher can inscribe the recipient's name.

School, church and community groups needing large quantities of certificates for special Grandparents' Day programs should place orders now to insure early delivery. Individual orders are also being taken now.

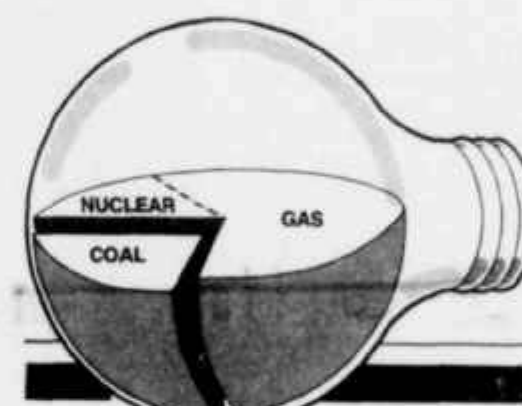
Orders received after August 22 will not be mailed out until after Grandparents' Day. Orders placed before this deadline will be mailed before Grandparents' Day.
