Becoming a part of your child's school

(Note: This is the first in a three part series on parent involvement in education.)
Children, teachers, parents and school administrators can all benefit from creative parent involvement in schools. What can better motivate children to learn than the knowledge that their parents and teachers all value their education and keep in touch about their progress? The common image of a fearful child carrying a note about his or her negative behavior from teacher to parent is eliminated when there is a frequent exchange of brief notes or calls between home and school through which teachers and parents share information about the child's strengths, progress and needed changes. Classroom studies spring to life when family members share travel, job and other experiences.

Classrooms are better suited to children's needs when parents and teachers share the responsibility of matching students and teachers. Parents who have become part of their children's school lives through notes, conferences, phone calls, or volunteering report many benefits for themselves and their children. Parents who volunteer for the school board or curriculum committees know the satisfaction, as well as the long hours and many compromises, of helping to shape school policy. Parents who volunteer or observe at school learn about their own children through contact with others of the same age. For some parents, voluntarily sharing their talents is a first step toward a new career. Others feel a great sense of satisfaction from giving to the community through the school.

The major motivation, however, for most parents to become involved in their child's school is the child. Learning or behavior problems can often be avoided if parents and teachers communicate honestly in the early stages of a child's education. Parents who are knowledgeable about their child's learning program can offer their child and school personnel much needed support and encouragement. Parents who have an ongoing relationship with their child's teachers often find them to be helpful sounding boards and supporters as the child develops and changes.

Parents have ultimate responsibility for their child for nearly two decades. Although they do not need to know how to teach the intricacies of the metric system or the geography of Central America, they do have a right and a responsibility to become familiar with the people and institutions that

Marisol Salinas attends Texas Lions Camp

A diabetic youth from Eagle Lake enjoyed six days of camp fun and medical education at the Texas Lions Camp in Kerville. Marisol Salinas, 15, and 130 other campers attended the camp free of charge.

The focus of the camp is to help insulin dependent diabetic children understand and manage diabetes. A team of doctors, nurses, and dietitians from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston teach the campers about balancing their diets, testing blood sugar levels and giving their own insulin injections. The medical team helps the campers understand why the tests are necessary and helps them understand their meaning.

Activities at camp include swimming, nature study, basketball, volleyball, canoeing, tennis, golf, ceramics, snorkeling and many more. All activities are supervised by an experienced counselor staff.

The Eagle Lake Lions Club sponsored Marisol and made it possible for her to attend the camp.

Vaughters completes basic army training

During the training, students received instruction in drill and ceremonies, weapons, map reading, tactics, military courtesy, military justice, first aid and Army history and traditions.

Truckers unaware of Texas law

DPS license and weight service officers report they are encountering truckers who say they are unaware of a recently enacted Texas law, S.B. 332, which became effective on January 1, 1986, requires that the name of the owner, operator or lessee of commercial vehicles with three or more axles be displayed on both sides of the vehicles. All truck-trailers also are included. The statute mandates lettering with a minimum height of two inches.

Failure to comply with the law is a Class C misdemeanor offense which is punishable by a maximum fine of \$200.

Public utility vehicles, farm vehicles and trucks hauling timber in its natural state on the first movement are exempt from the statute.

DPS officials indicate that most tractor-trailer trucks were in compliance with the law before the effective date. The statute should help persons identify trucks which leave the scene of an accident or illegally dump waste.

Octoberfest for older Texans

Texas 55 and older have an opportunity to enjoy camping programs at the Texas 4-H Center at Lake Brownwood this fall. Called Octoberfest '86, the camping program offers older Texans a chance to spend a week "learning and doing" in a comfortable and supportive atmosphere, says a 4-H specialist with the Texas A&M University System.

This year's program offers five different sessions: Sept. 30-October 3, October 7-10, October 14-17, October 21-24 and October 28-31. Each session offers a variety of "hands on" experiences as well as a wide range of recreational activities. Reservation forms are available at any county Extension office and should be received by the Texas 4-H Center at least one week prior to the camp the individual plans to attend.
