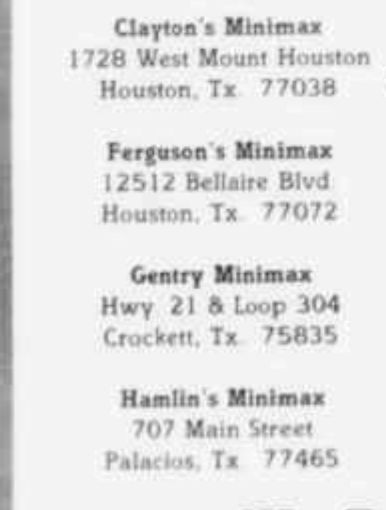
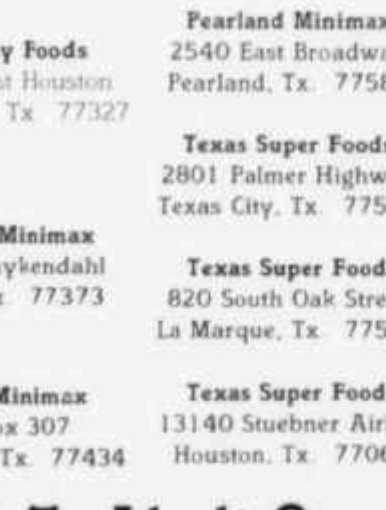

Weekend drug lab busted

A laboratory which police officials thought might have been a cocaine "crack" house was busted Sunday east of Columbus. It turned out instead to be a temporary methamphetamine manufacturing facility that could have turned out about \$120,000 in wholesale "speed."

Two men, from Wharton and Bay City, are in the Colorado County Jail under \$150,000 bond each on three related charges.

Sheriff Jim Broussard notified county news media before 7 a.m. Sunday and said they were about to enter what they thought was a crack house on Mentz Road. They were waiting on a search warrant from JP

Mary Ordner of Frelsburg, and for a Texas Department of Public Safety chemist from Houston.

The search took place about two hours later. They found three rough-rigged cooking facilities set up the day before to make the methamphetamine. One was in a pickup truck and the other two were in old out buildings. The DPS chemist said that had the process been completed, about 1,200 grams of the drug probably could have been produced.

With a wholesale value of about \$100 a gram, the chemist said the two men could have made \$120,000 with of the drug.

The cook house was located on property sheriff Broussard said was owned by one county resident who rented it to someone else. Those two were not connected to the lab.

long extension cord to power the heater. An officer said they could tell something was going on from the smell of the vapors.

The officers kept up their watch throughout Saturday night until about 5 a.m. Sunday when it appeared the men were leaving the property. The two were arrested and held at the scene until the warrant and chemist arrived between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m.

The property is located on the west side of the road that connects FM 949 and the Mentz Catholic Church.

Charged with one count of manufacturing drugs, and two counts of possession of a controlled substance are Robert H. Newlin, 34, of Wharton, and William Robert Gooch, Jr., 27, of Bay City. Sheriff Broussard said that although the county impounded some property owned by the men, including a truck and some weapons, the amount of drugs found does not qualify the county to sell the property for public benefit.

Another officer on the scene said the men were heavily armed, and that when they started searching a truck, one suspect said he wished they (the officers) would be careful since some of the materials could explode.

The DPS chemist would not identify the substances used in the manufacturing process, saying that he did not want to publicize how easy it was to make the drug. He said the materials were available at several hundred Houston outlets.

The rough cooking apparatus involved a heating plate, large pan filled with oil, and in that sat a large beaker with rubber stopper on top. Out of the stopper lead a tube to an outside receptacle. The chemist said it took 12 to 18 hours to go through the first step of making the drug, then three or four hours to complete the second step.

Parent-training workshops scheduled

Parent training workshops will be held throughout the Rice Consolidated ISD during the month of October, according to a school district announcement.

The objective of the workshops is to provide information to assist parents with developing skills and strategies for home reinforcement of study skills and specific curriculum objectives. These workshops are scheduled in the evening and will last approximately one hour.

Specific topics to be covered in the workshops are: 1. scope and mastery of essential elements; 2. effective environment for home study; 3. strategies for enforcement of study skills; 4. placement, remediation and special programs; 5. promotion, retention, and 6. teacher-parent relations.

Attendance is voluntary but the district is encouraging attendance with the hope that parents will gain useful information to enable them to better insure the success of the children in their school work.
