**Views On Dental Health**  
**ON HIDING PARTIAL CLASPS**  
 The basic design of the removable partial is a framework of metal with metal clasps that grip the supporting teeth and hold the appliance in the mouth. There is generally acrylic over the ridge areas (the area of missing teeth) to support the replacement teeth.  
 Most of the esthetic problems with a removable partial have to do with the clasps, or hooks, that hold it in place. Patients feel that the illusion of naturalness is defeated by the hooks that immediately indicate "removable denture."  
 The simplest way of overcoming this is to alter the design of the partial. Retention and stability may still be obtained with smaller, thinner clasps. Clasps can be further hidden by placing them as far back on the tooth as possible. This is a very delicate procedure, however, because if the class is reduced too much, it loses its function. A partial that doesn't stay in the mouth is useless, no matter how esthetic it is. However, dentistry has come a long way in combining function with pleasing appearance in the area of dentures.

## Rice FFA Show rules and regulations

Following are rules and regulations for students participating in the Rice FFA Show and Sale which is scheduled for January 24:

- General rules**
1. Competition is open to only those students and FFA members enrolled in vocational agriculture at Rice High School.
  2. To be eligible to exhibit and sell livestock, each student must have their animal present at the designated initial weigh-in and each animal must be ear-tagged or tattooed.
  3. All animals to be purchased by students to be exhibited at the local show must have been approved by the vocational agriculture teachers prior to purchase.
  4. All exhibitors must be able to prove ownership of animals upon request.
  5. There will be no treatments prescribed or administering of drugs or medications on animals unless under the direct supervision of the vocational agriculture teachers or veterinarians.
  6. Each exhibitor can enter only one animal for the purpose of exhibition and sale at the local show.
  7. The age and size of animals will be discussed in the individual categories.
  8. All animals brought to the local show must meet all health requirements as set forth by a representative of the Texas Animal Health Commission. Any animal not meeting the necessary health requirements will be excused from the show.
  9. All exhibitors must be present for the initial weigh-in and final weigh-in, exhibition, and sale of their animals. The only exceptions allowed will be those students participating in scheduled UIL activities and those students that are not academically eligible.
  10. The chapter's livestock scales will be the official scales on which all exhibitors will weigh their animals. No other scale weight will be accepted. Animals not present for the official initial and final weigh-in will not be allowed to enter the show and sale.
  11. A minimum commission fee of 7% will be withheld from each exhibitors gross income. Funds collected will be used to pay expenses for the show and sale and will also be used for other chapter functions such as the chapter banquet.
  12. In order to assist local businesses in collecting fees from students, the vocational agriculture teachers may, at their discretion, deduct the necessary funds from the student's gross income to facilitate the faster payment of outstanding bills and loans.
  13. Exhibitors that win grand or reserve champion honors in any division, will be required to pay the purchase price of a buyer's banner that will be presented to the exhibitor's buyer. The price charged will not exceed the price paid by the chapter.
  14. All students exhibiting and selling livestock at the show and sale must be present at the completion of the sale. It is the responsibility of ALL students to observe and assist in loading their livestock to be delivered for processing. Failure to do so will result in a \$50 fine being deducted from the student's gross income. Each exhibitor is required to check out with the vocational agriculture teachers prior to leaving the grounds after the show.
  15. At the completion of the sale, some animals may be returned to the exhibitor's care until arrangements for delivery and processing can be made. It is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to provide this extra care. The vocational agriculture teachers and other individuals will assist members in delivering livestock.
  16. Students will receive payment for the sale of their livestock only when certain conditions and requirements have been met, such as: a.) when ALL funds from the sale of the livestock have been collected from the buyers; b.) when EVERY exhibitor has brought up to date or completed their project record book to the satisfaction of the vocational agriculture teachers; c.) when ALL exhibitors have written their buyer check, you have and had them approved by the vocational agriculture teachers (students will receive the first sheet of stationary and one envelope free, additional sheets will be paid by the student and postage will be paid by the student). Buyer thank you letters will be mailed by the vocational agriculture teachers. Failure to follow this rule will result in the delaying of payment to the exhibitor until proof of mailing the buyer thank you letter can be shown to the teachers, and d.) when ALL students have carried out the proper clean up and maintenance work on their livestock pens.
  17. Any situation that occurs and is not covered in any area discussed will be handled at the discretion of the vocational agriculture teachers with input from the school administrator.
  18. In the event that the vocational agriculture teachers determine that a progress show and sale is required to present their animals for inspection and review by the teachers and/or selected judges.
  19. Showmanship judging of livestock will take place during the time of judging and will be further conducted in a manner desired by the vocational agriculture teachers. Any student selected by judges to participate in showmanship preliminaries or finals is required to do so.
  20. No student is permitted to bid on their own animal (or another

student's animal) in order to raise bids. Furthermore, no student is permitted to buy their own animal back at the sale.

21. If a member of a student's family (parents, siblings, or other relation) purchase the student's animal, the buyer is still required to pay the full purchase price to the exhibitor's parents. Any final bid received will be the final selling price of the animal. All animals meeting the necessary qualifications must sell unless otherwise eliminated from the show. If the animal is brought to the show for the purpose of exhibition and is judged, then the animal must sell in the livestock sale.

- Steer rules**
1. All steers must be purchased before the initial weigh-in or permission must be obtained from the vocational agriculture teachers to purchase steers at a later date.
  2. All steers must be fed a ration that is acceptable by the vocational agriculture teachers.
  3. Any animal of a registered, purebred, or crossbred origin are acceptable to be exhibited.
  4. All steers will be classified on the date of the official initial weigh-in and will remain as such for the entire feeding period.
  5. Due to the small size of the show, all steers will be shown either according to breed or by weight division, depending upon which method fits the show situation the best.
  6. All steers must be halter broken and must be led into the show ring and the sale ring. Any animal found to be wild, unruly, and a hazard to the exhibitor, other exhibitors and their animals, or the show observers, will be excused from the show ring and will automatically be placed last on the sale order. At no time can any steer found in this position be allowed to sell for any more than the minimum price of any steer sold before it. (The reasoning behind this rule is to encourage all students to work with their animals and to be allowed to be used.)
  7. All steers must meet the minimum shrink weight of 750 pounds at the time of the official final weigh-in. A 5% shrink will be taken on the live weights of all steers.
  8. All steers must meet the grade of good to be eligible to compete.

## Texas' fuel tax is only average

Texas' temporary five-cent increase in gasoline tax on January 1 puts the state on a par with the rest of the country in highway user fees, according to an economist with the Federal Highway Administration.

"Fifteen cents a gallon is just getting up to the threshold of what is needed in the leading states, as far as taxation of motor fuel," said Tom Cooper, an economist with the FHWA in Washington, D.C. "The range is wide among the 50 states, from seven cents to more than 18 cents. At 10 cents a gallon, Texas was one of the lowest in the country."

Published reports listing Texas as a high-gasoline-tax state differ from the highway department's official statistics, according to Bob Lanier, chairman of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

"There are two major discrepancies," said Lanier. "In reports ranking Texas thirteenth highest, states having the same tax are grouped as one. For example, the five states taxing 16 cents per gallon are ranked in one place. Carrying this logic out, there are only 26 rankings. On this basis, it is true that Texas is thirteenth."

"But if the ranking allocates one position to each state, Texas ranks No. 20 of 50 states and the District of Columbia," Lanier said. "Three other states are tied for that ranking."

And the second discrepancy Lanier said.

"Other computations have ignored the sales tax many states charge on gasoline," said Lanier. "In some states, this amounts to more than the direct gasoline tax."

Lanier said that an average of all state gasoline taxes must be considered to get the full picture.

"If you average the latest figures from the Highway Users Federation and add any state sales taxes, the national gasoline tax average is 13.76 cents a gallon, compared to 15 cents in Texas," he said. "But our state maintains some 40,000 miles of farm-to-market roads that in many states are maintained by the counties. Since further tax increases occur throughout the year in other states, we expect our ranking to drop."

Cooper supports Lanier's prediction of further increases.

"The number of states taxing more than 15 cents a gallon is growing," he said.

But Lanier says the nickel increase enacted in 1986 has not resulted in an increase in highway funding for Texas.

"At 15 cents a gallon, our gasoline tax preserves the incentive made in 1984," said Lanier. "And it removes us from the general revenue category by placing highway funding entirely on a user-fee basis."

## FFA Trailride this Saturday

Roy D. Van Nort, trail boss, has announced that the annual FFA Trailride will be leaving from Sandy Creek Drive-in in Sheridan at 8 a.m. this Saturday, January 24. All entries must register with Mr. Van Nort at 7:30 a.m. prior to the ride. The trailride will end at Rice High School around 11 a.m.

Any Rice High School girl is eligible for the Trailride Sweetheart contest. Entries must be in the trailride or show an animal for judging.

All steers will be trimmed in a manner acceptable to the vocational agriculture teachers. All steers must be trimmed by either the vocational agriculture teachers or the student owning the animal.

10. No student will be allowed to artificially alter the color of a steer's hair coat. Failure to comply with this rule will result in a steer being placed last in the class in which it is being shown. The vocational agriculture teachers and the steer judge will be the persons responsible for enforcing this rule.

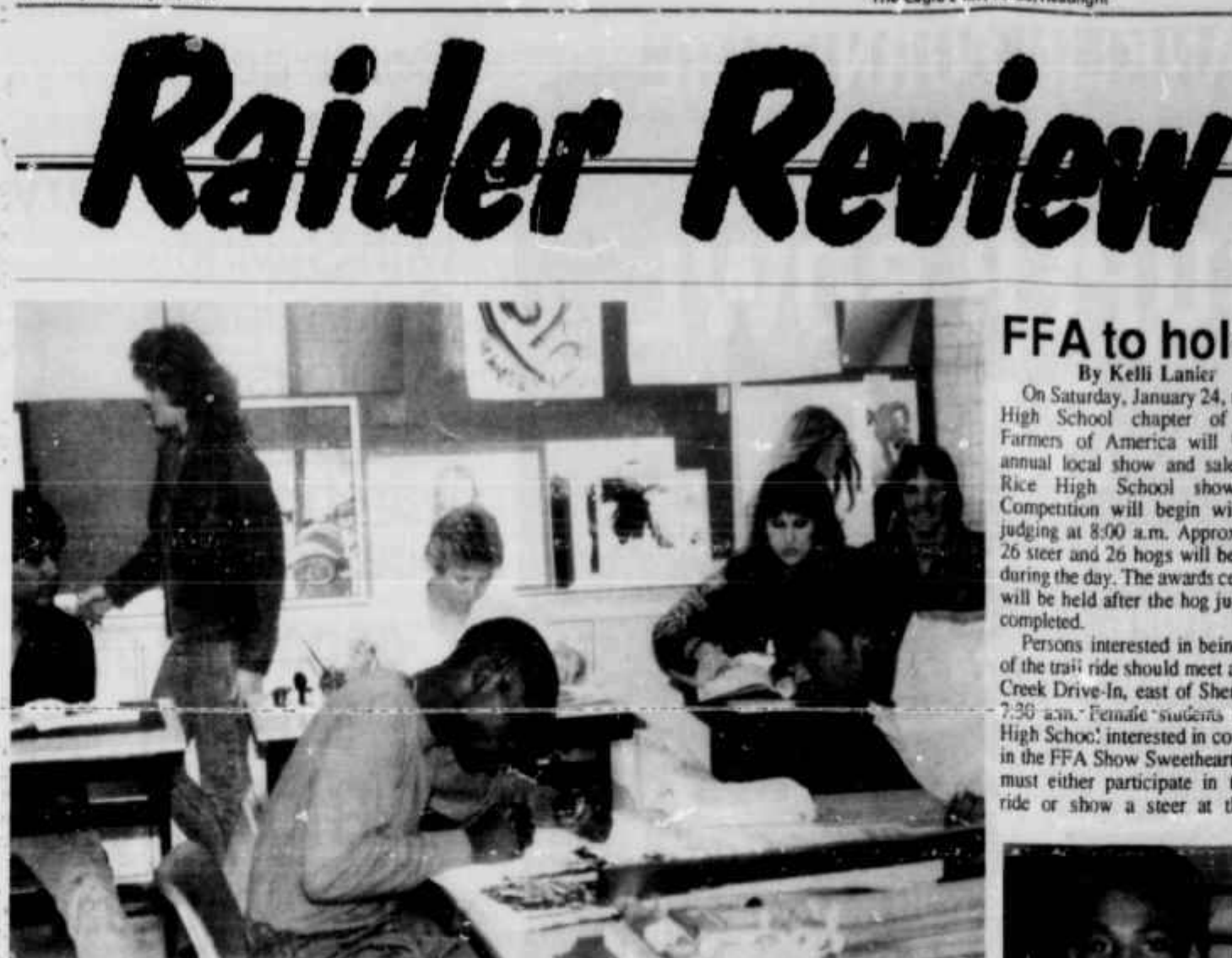
11. The vocational agriculture teachers reserve the right to enforce a maximum weight or a maximum pay weight of the steers sold in the sale if this particular step will enhance the sale of the animals in the best judgment of the teachers. (The number of available buyers and the state of the area's economy will be the determining factors in enforcing this step.)

12. Other situations, circumstances, or instances not covered in this division will be determined by the vocational agriculture teachers in the best interests of the students and the program.

**Swine rules**

1. The exhibitor must have owned their local show pig prior to October 4, 1986.
2. Each exhibitor must feed a proper feed ration that has been approved by the vocational agriculture teachers.
3. All swine must be presented for the initial weigh-in and final weigh-in and all hogs must meet the weight limit set by the vocational agriculture teachers.
4. After the final weigh-in, the hogs will be divided into three weight divisions as equal in number and all hogs must meet the weight limit set by the vocational agriculture teachers.
5. Entries that are artificially colored with paint, paste, powder, oil, or other dressing will be barred from showing. Only water will be allowed to be used.
6. Any swine exhibitor that does not comply with the rules that are listed will be barred from the show.
7. Other situations, circumstances, or instances not covered in this division will be determined by the vocational agriculture teachers in the best interests of the students and the program.
