## Potter to exhibit at art club

One of the intentions of the Live Oak Art Center is to bring exhibits to the county from promising new artists. It has the pleasure of doing this in February with Mark Potter's 1st one-man show. Mark is a self-taught wood sculptor. He describes his pieces as non-functional free form vessels and displays them on stands he makes from the roots and limbs of trees.

The old saying of one man's trash is another's treasure certainly is true in Mark's case. He never cuts down a live tree for use of its wood but instead searches for wood that people are going to discard. In fact most of his supply has been given to him.

Mark uses the burls, knot holes and other deformities from such wood as mulberry, box d'arc, walnut, oak and other hard woods to make his sculptures. Once he has decided on a piece, he saws it down to fit in a lathe and with a hand held tool he begins to shape it.

When through, the piece will be delicately thin no more than a fourth of an inch. To achieve this and maintain the natural beauty of the wood, Mark has had to improvise and make many of his own tools.

The last step is to hand rub the piece with five to six coats of oil.

Mark Potter is the son of Dr. and Mrs. R.H. Potter of Columbus. He has lived here most of his life and now operates his own business, The Columbus Mill and Cabinet Shop. Mark has shown his sculptures the past two years in the Magnolia Home Show and this March will be entering in the Houston Festival.
