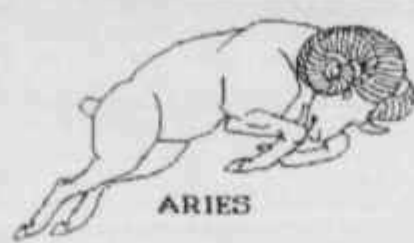

Texas is the cabbage patch kid

Cabbage is the biggest vegetable crop in Texas with almost 13,500 acres planted in the Winter Garden and Rio Grande Valley for the fall and winter harvest. Cabbage is usually nearly year round, but the peak harvest runs from January to April. Cabbage is still a great buy at the supermarket with averages of 19 to 25 cents a pound.

The National Academy of Sciences and the American Cancer Society have strongly recommended that we increase our intake of cruciferous vegetables like cabbage. Cabbage has also been attracting attention as a possible cancer preventative.

Although cabbage is a rather plain vegetable, it is sturdy and filling. Look for cabbage with tightly wrapped, crisp leaves, with well-trimmed solid heads containing no discolored veins. White cores are preferred over yellow ones.

Be sure to use the dark green, outside leaves which contain more iron than the pale ones closer to the core. One pound of cabbage equals five firmly packed cups of shredded cabbage, or about three cups cooked. Cabbage should be cooked quickly to retain the Vitamin C. Stir frying and steaming helps to conserve the nutrients. Cooking six to eight minutes is usually sufficient for most dishes. Steam shredded cabbage for 10 minutes, chunks a little longer.

This leafy green is a good source of fiber and should be eaten for its potassium, calcium, Vitamin C, A and the B vitamins. At only 20 calories per 1/2 cup serving, cabbage is a great dietary addition to a main dish or salad.

Red cabbage makes a more attractive salad or coleslaw. It is considered a specialty item and will cost two to four times as much as the green in the supermarket. Remember to use a stainless steel blade to cut red cabbage to avoid altering its purple-red color.

Cabbage is versatile. It makes cool coleslaws, crunch salads, tangy sauerkraut, crisp stir-fry dishes, and colorful centerpieces with chunks of your favorite cheeses and small cherry tomatoes toothpiked to a leafy head.

Try Skillet Cabbage for quick and easy cabbage. Cabbage Quiche and Cabbage Tamales lend an international flair to the Texas vegetable. For more information and recipes on Texas cabbage, write to the Texas Department of Agriculture, 2915 Westhollow Drive, Houston, Texas 77082.

Skillet Cabbage
1 C finely sliced cabbage
1/4 C finely chopped green pepper
1/2 C diced celery
1/4 C diced onion
1/2 C chopped tomato

1 T. vinegar
1/4 C water
Combine ingredients in large skillet. Cover and cook over low heat 5-10 minutes. Vegetables should be firm. Yield: 1 1/2 cups servings at 25 calories per serving.

Cabbage Quiche
1 (9 in.) pastry shell
1/2 C grated Monterey Jack cheese
1 C shredded ham
1 1/2 C grated cabbage
3/4 C very finely grated green onion
1 1/2 C light cream
1 T. white wine
1 T. brown sugar
3 eggs
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper

Cover pastry shell with foil and weight down with beans or other items. Prebake 5 minutes at 400 degrees F. Sprinkle cheese in bottom of pastry when pie shell is cooled. Add ham, cabbage and onion. In a bowl mix cream, wine, sugar, eggs, salt and pepper. Pour cream mixture over the ingredients in pastry shell. Bake quiche in 350 degree F. oven for 10 minutes. Lower heat to 325 degrees F. for 20-30 minutes or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serves four for an entree.

Cabbage Tamales
1 large head cabbage
1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
1 bell pepper, chopped
1 med. onion, chopped
1 1/2 C cooked rice
Salt and pepper to taste
1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
Separate 10-12 large leaves from cabbage. Cover leaves with water and cook until wilted and tender. Brown beef and drain excess grease. Mix beef, bell pepper, onion, rice, salt and pepper. Place about 2

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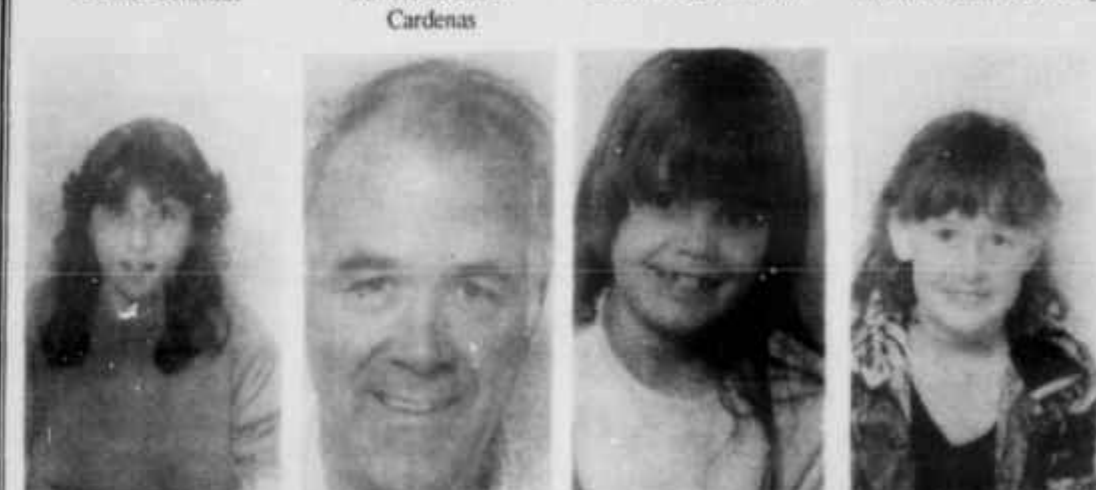
