These students' pictures will be displayed in the hallways at the Middle School for the entire month of April. Congratulations to these students for their efforts at school during the past month.



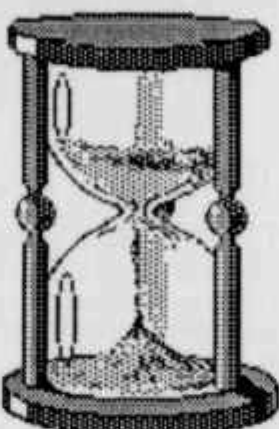

They are Rhonda Hodde and Grady Crysel who have both completed basic training last summer. Rhonda will be leaving on June 3 for six years to major in Biochemistry. Grady has also enlisted for six years for combat engineer training. His departure date is unknown at this particular time. Both Rhonda and Grady will continue their training this summer in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Several other students who deserve recognition are Mickey Scott, Phillip Reggins and Roxanne Cartu. Mickey will be departing on June 30 to serve in the United States Navy while training to become an airplane mechanic. Phillip has also enlisted in the Navy for four years and will leave on June 22. And last, but not least, is Roxanne. Roxanne will be going into the United States Army for two years to major in administration.

These students are setting excellent leadership abilities by seeking out what they want in life and trying their best to achieve it. They have made the decision to make something of themselves, to further their education in a field that will be helpful to both themselves and our society and should be commended for their courageous, voluntary action.
