Boyette family in Nigeria

Sandy and Barry wrote a letter to the people of Eagle Lake to share some of the things that have happened to them since they have left Eagle Lake.

"We arrived on January 10 after leaving a very cold and rainy Eagle Lake to find Lagos very hot and humid. Sounds like a quick trip doesn't it? After a twelve hour lay over in Dakar (the mechanic couldn't find his tools) we were nearly thirty-six hours reaching Nigeria from Houston. The first couple of days we were in cultural shock. Someone told us it would be like Hawaii. I wish I could remember who that someone was."

"After a week or so we started feeling a little more at home and by the time we reached the farm Sandy had put her return ticket back in her purse. The farm is very different from the rest of Nigeria. In some ways after a long day it almost reminds us of home. We have a small field of irrigated rice but at this time the rest of it is upland varieties and depends upon the rainy season for its water. The yields aren't quite as high, but imagine waking up tomorrow morning and not having to go walk your leaves."

"In Nigeria bribes are a way of life. Here they call it a dash. If the police stop you for inspection, 5 Naira (\$1.25 U.S.) will actually get you off the hook. I only wish this would work in the city of Fulshear."

Going to market and buying food is an interesting pastime here. Fresh fruit is available almost daily, but vegetables can only be bought on certain days. Each trader has a small area of space five or six feet wide and they usually all have the same goods. That's what makes it fun because you can bargain with them. At the big markets they usually have wood and ivory carvings and jewelry, such as silver, ivory necklaces and rings and malachite stones made into necklaces, earrings and bracelets. When we're interested in something the trader gives his price and as a rule we offer half as much."

At first Sandy would get pretty bored during the day. Now she has three monkeys to keep her busy. Mickey, Sarah and Hootie are always into something, but they are a barrel of laughs. The hunters in the bush shoot and trap the big monkeys for food and they've learned that Sandy will take the babies which aren't big enough to survive on their own. Mickey and Sarah are about 3 1/2 months old and they are eating about three bananas a day. Hootie is about 1 1/2 months old and he is up to one banana per day. Saturday we bought a parrot. We've decided to call him Barney. He can't talk yet at 4 1/2 months old, but the trader said he should start in another month or so."

Now that we have been here for nearly four months, we can look back and laugh at the scary feeling we had the first week here. We soon got used to the poverty, the customs and the culture that we see in the villages. It didn't take long before we realized how much we really take for granted the things we have in the U.S. of A."

Every day we think of you, our many friends in Eagle Lake, and we hope all is well there. We are having a great time and we will keep you posted on how things are going."

Hearing Thursday in Broussard case

A hearing is scheduled this Thursday afternoon in Columbus in the legal proceeds in which Colorado County Sheriff Jim Broussard was named in three indictments.

Broussard's attorney, filed several items last week.
