

Conservation Reserve Program grows

About 2.3 million acres of highly erodible croplands in Texas have been enrolled in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), federal officials said. Most of the CRP acreage is in the High Plains and Rolling Plains of Northwest Texas.

The CRP in effect pays farmers for taking erodible croplands out of production for 10 years and for planting the lands in permanent vegetative cover.

Ron George, CRP coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the program is an excellent opportunity for Texas landowners to create wildlife habitat on the unused lands. Landowners may lease CRP acreage to hunters for additional income.

"Farmers and ranchers will have another opportunity to enroll during the next sign-up period, July 20-31," George said. He explained that the USDA will pay up to 50 percent of eligible costs to establish trees and grass on the acreage placed in the reserve. These payments will partially reimburse farmers for the one-time costs of establishing required conservation practices on the cropland.

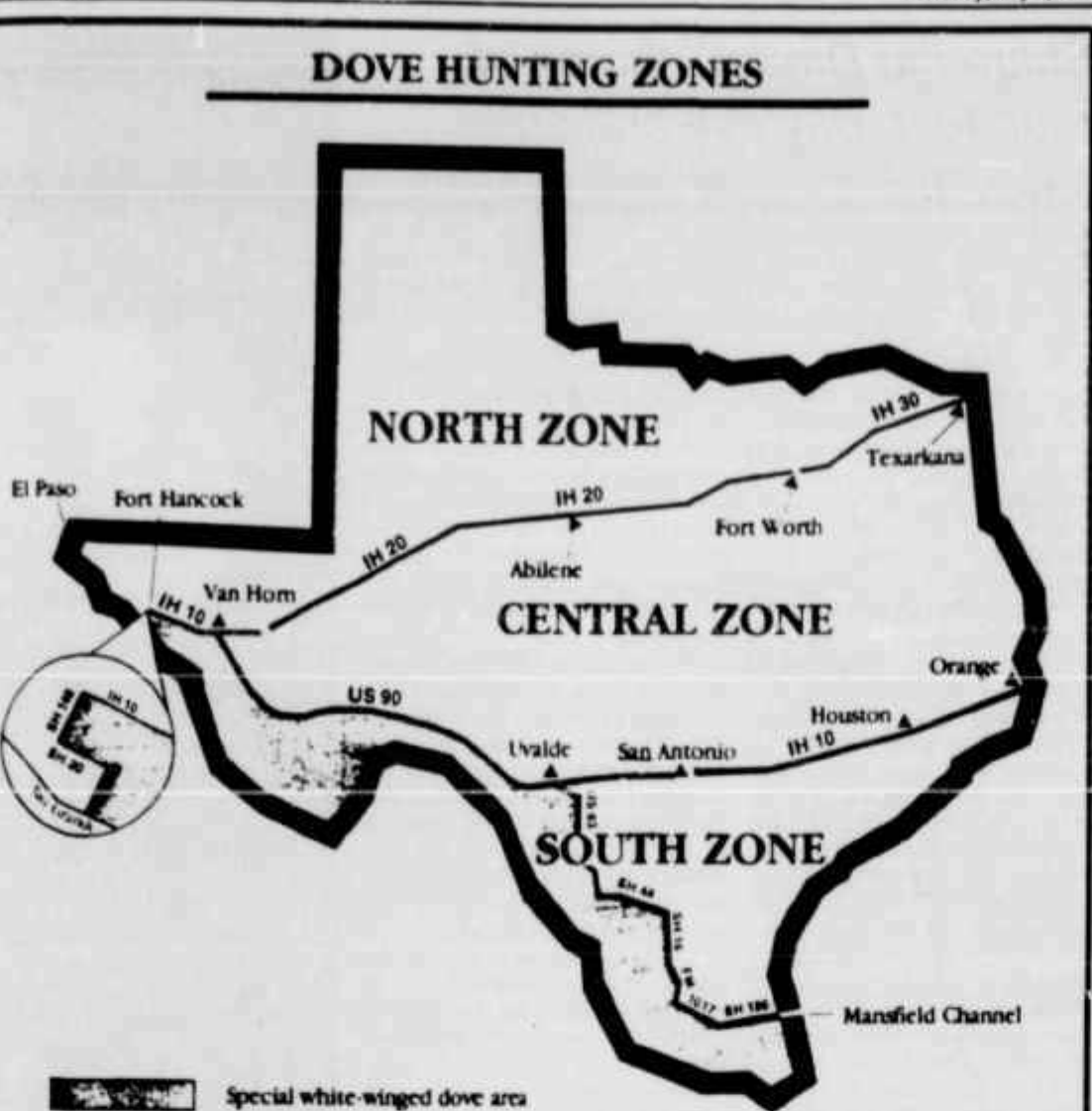

Teal season proposed to be set one week later

Hunting regulations for doves, rails and gallinules during the upcoming 1987-88 seasons would remain essentially unchanged from last year under a proposal announced by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

However, the nine-day September teal duck season is proposed to start one week later than last year, Sept. 19-27.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission will consider the proposals for adoption in a public meeting in Austin on July 23.

Ron George, dove program leader, said moving the teal season back one week would increase hunter success.

"Available records indicate the number of teal in Texas continues to increase throughout the month of September, so a later season should mean better hunting," said George.

Teal bag and possession limits also would remain unchanged from last year, at four teal in the aggregate per day and eight in possession.

Shooting hours would be sunrise to sunset as in the past.

No changes are proposed in season lengths or zone boundaries for mourning and white-winged doves, according to George.

The North Zone mourning dove season is proposed for Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 2-11; the South Zone mourning dove season would be Sept. 20-Nov. 18, except in the special White-winged Dove Area, where the season would be Sept. 20-Nov. 14.

The winter season for mourning doves in the South Zone would be Jan. 2-11.

As in the past, the white-winged dove season would be the first two complete weekends in September, which this year would be Sept. 5-6 and 12-13. Shooting hours during the four-day white-winged dove season would be sunrise to sunset.

Shooting hours during the mourning dove season in all zones would be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Dove bag limits also would be unchanged from last year, at 12

morning, white-winged and white-tipped doves in the aggregate including no more than two white-winged and two white-tipped doves per day. Possession limits are twice the daily bag limit.

During the white-winged season, the bag limit would be 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate including no more than two white-winged and two white-tipped doves per day; possession limits twice the daily bag limit.

As in the past, one fully-feathered wing would be required on all dressed doves at all times in the South Zone and the Special White-winged Dove Area.

The system of whitening sanctuaries also would remain unchanged during the 1987-88 seasons, with Sanctuary "A" open, the proposed season for rails and gallinules is Sept. 1-Nov. 9, and shooting hours would be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The proposed bag limit for king and clapper rails is 15 daily and 30 in possession; Sora and Virginia rails, 25 per day and 25 in possession. The gallinule bag limit would be 15 per day and 30 in possession.
