The main concern under consideration by the EPA remains the chronic effect of fish by the fungicide, Sweeney said. However, the Wharton Republican expressed confidence that additional data recently forwarded by the manufacturer will resolve any remaining questions.
"Ciba-Geigy is so confident we can pass this last hurdle and finally receive EPA approval that the company is gearing up its manufacturing capabilities in order to meet anticipated demand for the product," Sweeney said. "Because a decision is imminent, rice farmers might want to postpone purchasing fungicide products as long as possible."
Sweeney said he advised Vice President Bush as well as Texas Senators Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen of the need for their help over the next two weeks.
Sweeney represents the 14th congressional district, the fourth largest rice producing district in the country.

Registration of fungicide imminent

U. S. Congressman Mac Sweeney recently received the assurance of the Environmental Protection Agency that it will reach a decision within two weeks on registering a fungicide considered critical by the rice industry.

The decision may come sooner, according to the EPA, which would make the product available to farmers in time for use during this year's growing season.

"We're on the home stretch now," said Sweeney. "Now it's time to line up the troops for the final battle."

Sweeney recently formed a bipartisan coalition of 26 rice belt congressmen to lobby the EPA to reach a decision on the fungicide, called "Til", in time for this year's growing season. He cited the need to stem the more than \$100 million in crop losses the rice industry suffers yearly due to sheath blight, a fungus that attacks the rice plant.

Plaguing farmers in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Arkansas, the disease destroys as much as 58 percent of a state's rice crop. TIL, manufactured by the Ciba-Geigy Corp., is three times more active than the fungicide most commonly marketed for control of

Gulf shrimping season closure set June 1

Shrimping season in the Gulf of Mexico is slated for its annual closure from June 1-July 16, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

C. E. Bryan, director of fisheries resources programs, said shrimping will cease at 12:01 a.m. June 1 and reopen at 12:01 a.m. July 16.

Bryan said this is the first year since 1980 that the closure has been the standard period of time set by state statutes. "During the past six years, the department has exercised its authority to close the season earlier than the statutory closing because of early emigration of immature brown shrimp from the bays to the Gulf," Bryan said. "This year our surveys indicate they won't leave the bays so early."

Bryan said that it's too early to gauge the success of the 1987 Gulf shrimping season, but he said it potentially could be as good as the 1986 season which had the second-highest harvest in a decade. "The later migration of immature shrimp is normal, and does not necessarily mean there will be fewer shrimp," he said.
