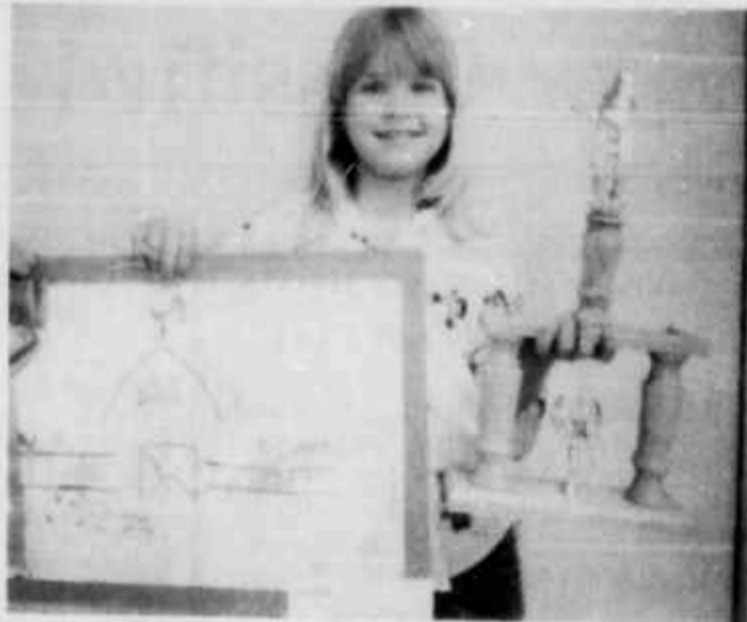

Eagle Lake Headlight

Council agrees to sell airport land; accepts paving bid for wider runway

In a special meeting Monday afternoon, Eagle Lake city council unanimously voted to sell nearly 21 acres of land it owns at the municipal airport, and use the money to widen and repave the main runway to 75-feet. It will be paved to about 3,450 feet.

The meeting was attended by the full council, including mayor Lanny Powers, as well as former mayor Elmer Struss and representatives of the Headlight and KULM.

Council opened the land sale bids on Tuesday night of last week, but delayed a final vote until the bidders and council representatives could meet. Gulf South Air motive, represented by Phillip Ferguson of Eagle Lake, submitted a bid of \$5,000 per acre only if council sold all the acreage. The bid, accompanied by a bid-bond cashier's check for more than \$20,000, was for \$104,400 for the approximately 20.88 acres, but the final price will be determined by the survey of the property.

Bids also were submitted by Charles McMurrough of Eagle Lake and John Peter of Wallis for only two of the parcels. Council wanted to meet

with all bidders to see if all could be accommodated.

The final action council took Monday was that the city would sell all acreage to Ferguson's company. That company then would immediately sell McMurrough one of three small parcels opposite his home on Airline Drive, and at the same time sell Peter one of the other small parcels near the junction of the two runways. Peter operates an aircraft maintenance facility at the airport, and both he and McMurrough plan to construct hangars.

Council also accepted Monday a bid from Jones Fink Paving Co. of Sealy to do the paving work. Mayor Powers said he plans to meet with Colorado County commissioners' court Monday morning and ask for their assistance. He said he has discussed with commissioner Sonny Spanhel a plan to remove some of the gravel and fill dirt that former commissioner Bill Soles used on the partially constructed east-west runway at the northern edge of the airport property. Powers said he and Spanhel agree there should be no problem in obtaining county approval for the

work, but because commissioner Spanhel has his equipment obligated for other work, construction could not begin immediately. The 25-foot additional width will be on the northwest side of the main runway, and runway safety lights on that side will be repositioned.

Jones Fink's bid included costs for digging out parts of the runway where the base needs stabilizing.

Powers also said a delay would be beneficial to the agricultural flying operations at the airport, which is important since the next several weeks are peak workload times for aerial application services.

In discussing the land sale, Powers said a council committee of councilman Vic Corman, city manager Robert Klockman and himself met with the bidders last week at the First National Bank. The bidders met two other times, Monday morning Ferguson again met with the council committee and detailed the sales arrangements which council approved Monday evening.

There were other stipulations Gulf South Air motive attached to their bid, and Corman detailed their status. Ferguson required all proceeds to be used immediately for airport improvements. It was noted that the cost of construction probably would consume all funds, but that the word "immediately" was not proper since there will be delays as mentioned. He said the Gulf South's interest was to see the work was done as soon as possible, avoiding lengthy delays. Gulf South required the runway to be widened to 75-feet which council agrees. Because a previous motion by council called for only a 50-foot runway, Corman made a motion, which was unanimously approved, officially changing council's position to show the 75-foot width.

Before seeking bids, council agreed to bring water and sewer utilities to the property. A stipulation by

Corman did emphasize that council was committed to the statement: "No pavement laid until payment made." He also said Ferguson told him his company would allow the high school to continue the hog farm at the airport for at least a year at no charge since Ferguson plans no immediate improvements on the property.

Ferguson's interest in seeing the runway improved is associated with his preliminary negotiations to purchase and move a highly regarded aircraft maintenance company to the Rice Aero hangar here, which Gulf South previously purchased.

Ferguson also said he talked in the past several days with McMurrough about hiring him to manage some of his prospective airport operations.

Monday night Ferguson said a purchase contract with the aircraft maintenance company would be forwarded to them on Tuesday of this week.

purchase all parcels and will sell the blocks designated as 1 and 3 to Charles McMurrough and John Peter, respectively. Gravel will be taken from the unfinished runway and will be used to widen the north-south runway.

Bill reinstates 5-day license to non Texans

State Rep. Robert Saunders has announced the House's passage of his HB 1262, which would allow nonresidents to obtain a special temporary five-day hunting license.

When the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department underwent Sunset review in 1983, the legislature enacted major revisions in the Parks and Wildlife Code. During this process, the provision for a nonresident temporary migratory bird hunting license was erroneously repealed. Saunders' bill would reinstate the five-day non-

resident license; however, it would enlarge the category of animals to include all game except deer and turkey.

The Parks and Wildlife Department requested the enlargement because it is less costly to administer the provision if it applies to all small game.

Saunders said he bases his reasons for introducing the bill on economics and reciprocity. Since the repeal of the temporary license in 1985, the number of nonresident hunters in this state

has decreased from 28,000 to an estimated 21,000 in 1986.

This decline of 7,000 hunters per year has cost our local economies approximately \$6,300,000 annually, because each hunter spends on the average \$900 each per trip, Saunders said. "The five-day temporary license would cost a maximum of \$37.75 with an average cost of \$25. The temporary license would attract more out-of-state hunters, which would add new revenue to bolster our local economies. The passage of this bill is vital to

the economic development the state derives from duck and goose hunting."

On the reciprocity issue, Saunders said, "Migratory birds nest in other states and are maintained by programs funded by taxpayers in those states. By hunting season, however, the birds have migrated to this area. To encourage states to continue their assistance programs, Texas should allow the nonresidents to hunt here since these nonresidents help to maintain the birds during the off season."

Broussard trial to begin August 3; additional hearing set

Although the trial date for Colorado County sheriff Jim Broussard has been set for the first week in August, at least one additional pre-trial hearing will be held this month.

Broussard was indicted last January for two counts of tampering with governmental records, and one count of official misconduct regarding funds at the sheriff's control.

At the next pre-trial hearing, set for June 18 at 1 p.m., Broussard's attorney will have the opportunity to protest amended indictments that were given to visiting judge Thomas Blackwell in a second pre-trial hearing held on Thursday of last week.

It was not clear at that hearing what the exact status of those amended indictments are, since Texas laws on amended indictments apparently are relatively untested. At a pre-trial hearing last month Broussard's defense attorneys argued that the original indictments were not specific and that amended indictments should not be allowed since they were not directly issued by a grand jury.

Broussard's attorney, Houston

Munson, also has other motions awaiting a ruling by judge Blackwell. At last Thursday's hearing he told the judge that although special state prosecutor Jim Vollers apparently had time to talk to The Houston Chronicle, he has not had time to produce some information Munson requested—and the judge approved—last month. One was a list of prospective witnesses. Vollers had a copy at Thursday's hearing and gave it to Munson.

The other concerned information and records provided by Broussard to the grand jury. Munson said the sheriff gave the jury so much information he no longer had enough records in his possession to file his income tax return. Blackwell instructed the two sides to get together. While Vollers said he could not allow all material to be returned to the sheriff—he said some of it is pertinent to the trial—he would allow Munson to obtain whatever possible. The judge told Vollers to allow Munson to copy information Vollers plans to retain.

The only change in the indictment charging Broussard with using government money for his own use (between \$750 and \$20,000, according to the indictment) was that the words "as a public servant" were inserted after his name. Last month the defense argued that without that information, the law under which the indictment was prepared did not apply.

There were major revisions in the other indictments concerning "tampering with governmental records." The first one claims that about August 1, 1986, Broussard threw away receipts written for money paid by the public at the sheriff's office from August 1, 1983 to July 31, 1986, for copies of teletype information. The public can get a teletype copy of vehicle registrations which are needed for license renewals and other purposes.

The other amended indictment claims the sheriff threw away a deposit slip on or about June 15 of last year. The amended indictment included a copy of the deposit slip. The copy shows a date of May 12, 1986. It shows checks totaling \$5,258 were presented for deposit and that \$3,500

cash was returned to the depositor with \$1,758 actually going into the "Sheriff Jim Broussard Special Account" at the Columbus State Bank. The slip shows the initials "JB."

Both of those indictments include the statement: "The grand jury avers and alleges that said records are not available to it, and are in the possession of the said Jim Broussard, or are lost or destroyed, and the said Jim Broussard is hereby called upon and notified to produce the original of said records upon the trial hereof, or secondary evidence will be resorted to to prove the contents of said records."

Special prosecutor Vollers also asked the court to allow him to continue using an outside investigator used during the grand jury investigation of Broussard. But Vollers said, the investigator's bill for previous work done was not paid by Colorado County commissioners although the work was ordered by the county grand jury. Judge Blackwell said he would like to hear from commissioners court on their reason for not paying the bill.
