Colorado County sesquicentennial committee seeking artist to commemorate 186 events

1866 was a year to go down in history for Texas. All communities in the state celebrated various events throughout the year, and after all the records were finalized for Colorado County, it was established that there was a nice surplus of funds on hand.

The Colorado County committee held a special meeting on Thursday, June 4 to decide on how to commemorate this special year by using the funds for this purpose. A short business meeting was chaired by chairman Crockett Leyendecker, with reports of various committees given, and the treasurer's report given.

After much discussion it was made a motion, seconded, and carried to commission an artist to depict the opening "flag ceremony" by painting it on canvas, and hanging it in the Colorado County Courthouse. It was agreed that a montage of events, representing every community in the county, would add special flavor, and

give historic meaning to our sesquicentennial year, when viewed fifty to a hundred years from now. Added interest was suggested to include a renovation of the fountain on the south side of the courthouse, and possible detailing the bottom of the fountain with a star in ceramic tile, depicting the year 1866.

Any artist in the area, who is interested in competing for this selection, may contact Mr. Leyendecker at 903 Front Street, Columbus, 732-3302. A committee will be named to evaluate the background and abilities of each applicant, and past work reviewed. Bids may be turned in by the artist, after they are made familiar with what is suggested for the 4'x6' mural. A month was allotted in which to find and select a professional artist for this position.
